MORE TROUBLE IN THE CABINET.

LONDON, June 28. The threatened split in the Cabinet over the Irish problem occupies a prominent place in all the morning papers. Most editorials appeal to the Unionists to settle their differences and get down to the main business of the war. The Daily News says even if there comes a split in the Unionist party, the Coalition Government should weather the storm. It would make us the mock of Europe. If the Government fails to do so at an hour when the Allies are making their great effort against the enemy in the field. The Daily Mail asks, are we at war or are we playing still the old game of party politics? Any attempt to throw the whole nation back into the whirlpool of the Irish question is idle and mischievous. For such pettiness the nation at large has nothing but impatient contempt.

GERMANS ATTACK POSITIONS AT FLEURY.

PARIS, June 28. German troops last night delivered another attack on French positions near Fleury on the sector of the Verdun front over which violent fighting has been in progress for several days. The assault was checked by the French fire, the War Office announced to-day. There was spirited fighting near Thiaumont work which the Germans captured several days ago, but no change has occurred in the situation there.

KING CONSTANTINE SIGNS ROYAL DECREE.

ATHENS, June 28. The situation in Greece remains critical and full of uncertainty, although the demands of the Allies are being rapidly carried out. The Royal Decree for general demobilization of the army was signed by King Constantine yesterday, and a Venizelos adherent, Zymbrakakis, will be sworn in as Chief of Police to-day. Rear Admiral Damianos has been appointed Minister of Marine. Administrative Countouriotis, who was first named, refused the appointment.

PRUSSIAN LOSSES 2,740,194.

AMSTERDAM, June 28. Latest Prussian casualty lists, covering the period from June 8th to 20th bring the total of Prussian losses to 2,740,194. These figures do not, it is believed, include the losses at Verdun.

FRENCH QUELL SERIOUS REVOLT.

BARAT, Morocco, June 28. French troops have quelled a serious revolt of the tribes in Eloud region in Algeria after fierce fighting. The rebels offered desperate resistance, and were defeated only after their principal stronghold had been stormed by two French columns. Their leaders then surrendered.

THE SHACKLETON EXPEDITION.

MONTE VIDEO, June 28. The Shackleton Antarctic Expedition may be made by the Uruguayan government, which furnished the steamer with which Sir Ernest made his recent futile attempt to reach Elephant Island where his party is marooned. The government has given.

ITALIAN SUCCESSES.

ROME, June 28. The Italians have flung back the Austrians a further distance on the Trentino front. The War Office to-day announced the capture of Monte Diamondo and Monte Caviglio.

FOUR KILLED AND FIVE WOUNDED.

AMSTERDAM, June 28. According to Bucharest despatches in a German newspaper received here, four persons were killed and five wounded by the police at Galatz, Roumania, on Monday, while representing a demonstration of workingmen against the high prices of food-stuffs.

BULGARIA UNEASY.

BERLIN, June 28. Social reports indicate that Bulgaria is uneasy owing to the possible consequences of Greece's capitulation to Entente demands. It is said that official Bulgarian circles declare that Bulgaria would be forced to regard Greece as an open enemy. Sofia feels that Greece's capitulation has caused the whole Balkan problem to enter a new stage.

THE KARLSRUHE RAID.

BERLIN, June 28. Queen Victoria of Sweden, sister of the Grand Duke Friedrich of Baden, was at Castle Karlsruhe, during the recent French air raid on that German city, when 110 persons were killed by bombs, says the Overseas News Agency. A despatch from Karlsruhe to-day says she escaped harm, as on the occasion of the previous raid when she also was in the city. In a mission church during the bombardment were the Grand Duke and Dowager, Grand Duchess Louise as well as the Dowager Duchess of Saxe. The service continued, however, despite the explosions occurring outside, the entire assembly singing a hymn. Afterwards, before the raid was entirely over, and some explosions were still being heard the Grand Duchess Louise visited the wounded. The despatch charges that the bombs dropped were poisonous in their effect.

SENTENCE OF LIEBKNECHT.

BERLIN, June 28. Doctor Karl Liebknecht, Socialist leader, was sentenced to-day to 30 months' penal servitude, and dismissal from the army for attempted high treason, gross insubordination and resistance to authorities.

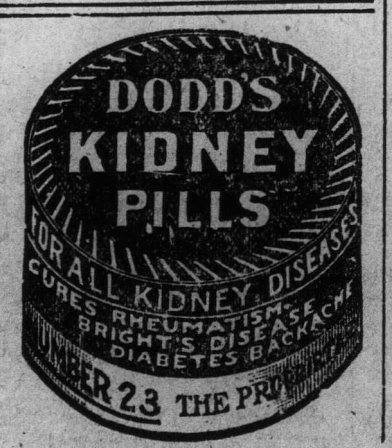

Your Boys and Girls.

The ordinary breakfast toast is not suitable for a baby. For him the bread should be at least one day old and be cut in very thin slices. The slices should be placed on edge in a toast rack in the oven to dry, or kept separated by some other means. Leave the oven door partly open. The slices should not brown, but after they are dry they may be lightly toasted and should be tender and of a uniform dryness throughout.

Dried bread is similar to toast. Pull a loaf of fresh bread in pieces and dry in the oven in the same way, then toast very lightly, as needed. No fresh-baked or hot breads of any kind should be given to the baby.

Bran bread is also good. It is made of one cup of cooking molasses, 1 teaspoonful of soda, 1 small teaspoonful of salt, 1 pint of sour milk or buttermilk, 1 quart of bran, 1 pint of flour. Stir well and bake for one hour in a slow oven. It may be baked in a loaf or in gem pans as preferred.

Traps Getting Big Fares

Traps at Golden Bay, P.B., are taking from 30 to 70 quintals each daily with bright prospects, according to a message just received by the Marine and Fishery Department. It further stated that at Red Island traps had from 50 to 100 quintals. West of that place prospects are splendid.

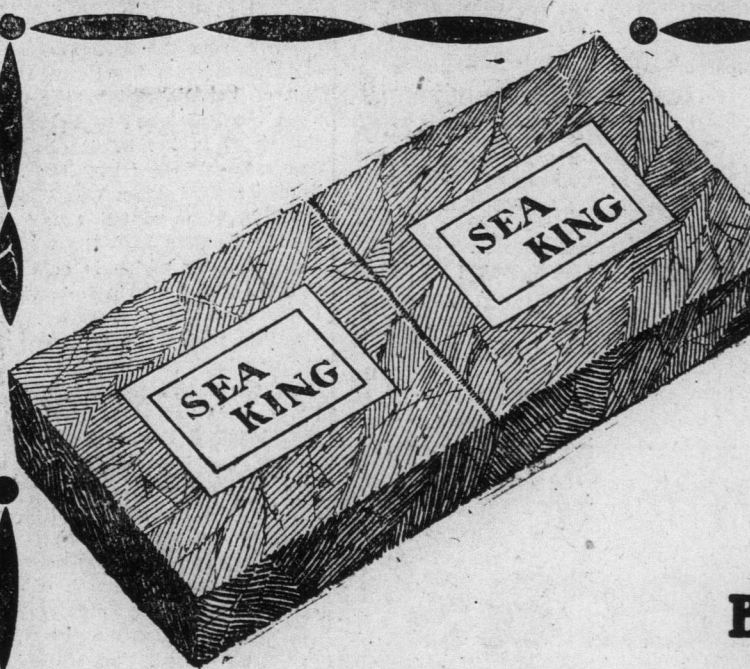
