The Elks defeated the City by goals to 7 in the Charity game played last night in the Prince's Rink, before about 1100 people. In spite of the factthat the ice, as was only to be expected, was very soft and there was a lot of water around the sides of the rink, the game was quite a good one, being fast, and at times, quite exciting. Some very spectacular individual dashes were made during the game, Robertson in particular, getting in some very fine work in this direction. Both goal keepers put up excellent exhibitions and had a difficult time trying to keep their respective goals clear. Karl Trapnell who made his first appearance for the season turned out for the Elks and received a great ovation. A feature of the game which was absent from previous games of the season, was the fact that not a single penalty was awarded throughout. THE START.

The game was started at. 7.30 p.m. by Mr. Gus Herder who was referee. Play during the first period was quite fast, both sides getting in some excellent individual and combined work. For some time several good attempts at scoring by players of both teams failed until after 10 minutes play when Canning, notched up the first goal for the 'City: Soon afterwards Ewing equalized by scoring from a pass by Cahill and before long Murphy brought the Elks score up to 2. There was no further scoring in this period. The

was a most exciting one. 
