For the secret of it is, you steep the tea as soon as the kettle boils, and any old tea will taste pretty good, I'll bet you.

But it is just as well to take the best tea with you, it doesn't cost much more. The last time we were out we had a splendid tea and it only cost us 65c. lb. It had a sort of artistic name—"Mount View". We bought it at Henry Blair's. They had another good tea there at 50c. per pound, but the clerk said "the best is the best", and we believe him.

Freshly boiled water is the secret of the cup of tea you drink out camping, fishing, berry picking or pic-nicking, but it is just as well to have the best tea. You can get it for 65c. per lb. at Blair's "Mount View", that is the slogan.
