Obituary.

WALTER J. DUGGAN.

(H. F. SHORTIS.)

A cable was received from East Cambridge, Mass., U.S.A., last evening by Mr. William Duggan announcing the death of his brother, Walter J., which occurred early yesterday morning, in the 67th year of his age. The deceased gentleman was born in the old homestead in St. John's West sixty-seven years ago, and was for several years employed as weigh-master in the enterprising firm of Messrs. P. & L. Tessier. About 17 years ago, like so many of his countrymen, he decided to seek his fortune in the United States, and on his journey he entered the well-known and extensive firm of Scoville & Co., where many of his countrymen have been, and are still employed. By strict attention to his duties and the natural talent always exhibited by Newfoundlanders abroad he quickly rose to a responsible and remunerative position in the Lard Department of the above extensive firm, which he held throughout. Some twelve months ago his health commenced to fail, and after he entered the Massachusetts Hospital to undergo an operation for serious internal complaint, and despite all the medical skill of the physicians of that famous institution,

fortified by all the rites of the Roman Catholic Church, he passed peacefully and resignedly into the hands of his Creator yesterday morning. The deceased was a fine type of a Newfoundland, and always took the deepest interest in the welfare of his native land. He was of the old school, a man of exceptional qualities of heart, honest and conscientious, and a staunch and pious Catholic. His quiet unassuming manner, his readiness to offer a helping hand to his countrymen who came into contact with him, won for him innumerable friends in the land of his adoption. He visited his native city upon two or three occasions since he left our shores—principally during the Old Week excursions, and always manifested the greatest delight at the many improvements which he witnessed after his long absence abroad. The deceased was the second youngest son of the late Walter and Mary Duggan, and descended from probably the oldest families (born on the paternal and maternal side) in St. John's West, having been one of the first to erect a residence, which stands to-day in that portion of the district. There are left to mourn a wife (nee Miss Kelly, daughter of the late Mr. Michael Kelly, South Side), two brothers, William, caretaker of the Museum, Thomas, who lived with deceased in East Cambridge, and one sister residing in the old homestead, West End of this city.

Finger Reading More Thrilling Than Sight.

LOUISVILLE (A.P.)—Laborious as finger reading may appear, it possesses all the delights and charms that sight reading gives, and perhaps it has even an added thrill because greater concentration is possible. In the opinion of Miss Susan B. Merwin, Secretary for the American Printing House for the Blind, Miss Merwin is actively engaged in the work at the printing plant here, which is the largest establishment of its kind in the world.

The embossed book, according to Miss Merwin, is the cornerstone of the education of the blind. "The books of the American Printing House for the Blind go to libraries throughout this country, to the Philippines, Hawaii and other distant parts of the world. The federal government yearly gives \$50,000 toward the upkeep of the printing institution. In addition to text books, the printing house turns out the best in literature and music, with a considerable supply of current fiction.

Through the co-operation of the American Bible Society and other organizations, the Bible is made available to the blind in several kinds of embossed print. The embossed books are necessarily large and cumbersome.
