

## British Railway Strike is Settled.

Resignation of Secretary of U.S. Navy Called For—Shortage of Coal in Cape Breton Results in Closure of Works.

**RAILWAY STRIKE SETTLED.**  
LONDON, Jan. 29.—The railroad strike has been settled and the men have decided to resume work immediately. The agreement was reached at a joint conference between the Association of Locomotive Engineers and Firemen and railway officials which started at 10:30 last night and ended at 4:30 this morning. Details of the agreement will be published to-day.

**SECRETARY DENBY ASKED TO RESIGN.**  
WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—Unless the resignation of Secretary Denby was in the hands of President Coolidge before sundown to-day, Senator Walsh, Montana, declared in Senate to-day, he would seek action in that body to remove the present head of the United States head of the Navy Department. There are persistent rumors that there will be a cabinet shakeup as a result of the revelations resulting from the investigation of the United States Naval Oil Reserve at Teapot Dome, Wyoming.

**MAGINARY INTERVIEWS WITH BRITISH PREMIER.**  
LONDON, Jan. 28.—An official statement issued to-day says that Premier Ramsay MacDonald has given no interviews since he took office and points out that the interviews with him which are appearing now were given before his assumption of office when he was merely a private individual. The statement adds, this does not, of course, imply that his general lines of policy differ from those foreseen. "The question of Russia and our relations with France, reparations, etc., have to be developed very carefully and in the most liberal spirit, always with a view to the Government's policy for putting Europe more on its feet and re-establishing co-operation with everybody."

**NEGOTIATIONS EXPECTED TO END TO-DAY.**  
GLACE BAY, N.S., Jan. 28.—That to-morrow afternoon will see the end of the negotiations in the wage agreement between representatives of the Dominion Coal Company and the United Mine Workers is more than probable. What the outcome of the conference will be can only be conjectured. The U.M.W. have not receded from their demands for the 20 per cent. wage increase and the company officials have not yet approached the stage where they will talk of increase.

**BIG FIRE AT LITTLETON, N.H.**  
LITTLETON, N.H., Jan. 28.—Fire swept the main street of this White Mountain town to-day and was still beyond control after raging three hours and causing damage estimated at nearly a million dollars. No lives are known to have been lost.
