**Calendar Reform
Would Change the
Year to 13 Months**

Banconer Man Says Great Christian

Churches Consent to Proposal.

VANCOUVER, B.C., Oct. 5.—Canadian Press.—First steps toward the form of the Calendar to divide the present year of twelve months, into 13 months, have been taken by the League of Nations Committee on Calendar reform in fixing the date of Easter permanently on the second Sunday in April, beginning in 1928.

Moses B. Colworth, of Vancouver, director of the International Fixed Calendar League, has announced receipt of news from the committee that the unanimous consent of all great Christian churches authorities had been secured to make the change.

The plan is to make the last day in each year an international "year day" and dividing the 52 weeks into 13 months.

A new month "Sol" is proposed to be made from the last two weeks of June and the first two weeks of July. Each month would consist of four complete weeks like February, 1925, and all times for earning and spending would be equal or exact multiples of each other.

**Find Woman
Dead in Bath Tub**

ELECTRIC SHOCK SAID TO HAVE

BEEN CAUSE OF DEMISE.

An electrical drying apparatus led to

the death of Mrs. D. Langlois, 471 St.

Andre street, last Friday evening.

Boarders at the home of the deceased

discovered her lying dead in her bath after an electric shock had hurled

her into the latter from which she had stepped a few moments previous-

ly.

Police who investigated the tragedy

believe Mrs. Langlois was drowned

while unconscious from the shock she

received while using an electrical drying

machine.

Shortly before 6 o'clock a boarder

at the Langlois home entered the house

and found the bathroom door locked. Returning 15 minutes later

she found the door still locked. She then

summoned other boarders to help her break down the door to discover

what was wrong.

Mrs. Langlois was found lying face

down in a bath full of water. She was

dead when lifted out. The machine which

proved fatal was found, still working, hanging from a plug in the wall.

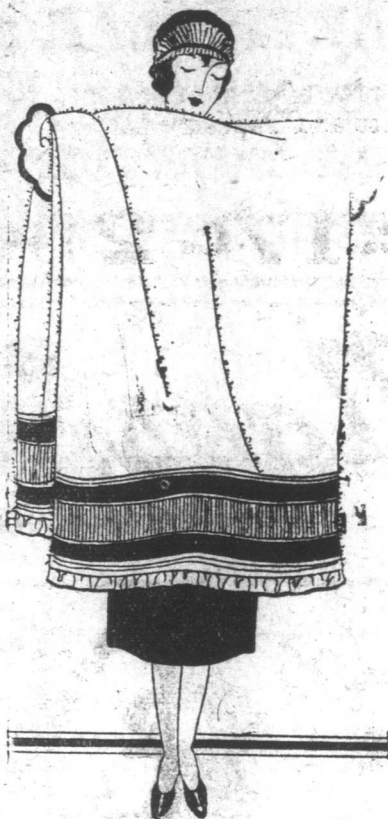

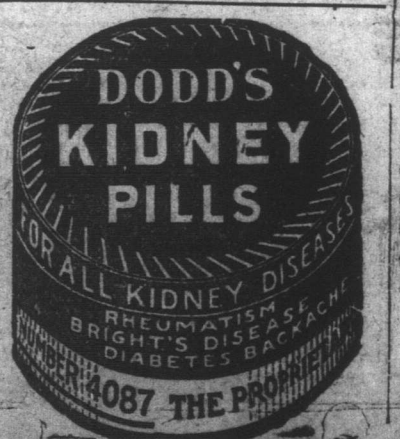
