The Terms of Agreement.

The following are the propositions as a basis of agreement, made by Earl Gran-ville to the Hudson Bay Company for the transfer of the North West Territory to the government of Canada, and which it is reported in Ottawa have been accepted

1. The Hudson's Bay Company to surrender to Her Majesty all the rights of the government, property, &c., in Rupert's Land, which are specified in the 31 and 32 Vic., c. 105, sec. 5; and also all similar rights in any other part of British North America, not comprised in Rupert's Land, Canada or British Columbia.

2. Canada is to pay to the Company £300,000 when Rupert's Land is transferred to the Dominion of Canada.

3. The Company may within twelve months of the surrender, select a block of land adjoining a cach of its stations, within the limits specified in Article 1.

4. The size of the blocks is not to exceed — acrea in the Red River Territory, nor 3,400 acres beyond that territory, and the aggregate extent of the blocks is not to exceed — acrea in the blocks are to be in the shape of parallelograms, of which the length is not more than double the breadth,
