DEATH OF ROBERT FORBES

Was One of the Oldest Residents of Wallacetown

The death occurred at the home of his daughter at Gables on Thursday morning of Mr. Robert Forbes, one of the old residents of Wallacetown. Mr. Forbes had been unwell for nearly a year, and several weeks ago went to Gables, but rapidly grew worse. He was in his 74th year, and was born in Scotland, coming to Canada with his parents when nine years of age and settling in Wallacetown, which then comprised but a few houses. He was the last of his family and one of the very few living in the community at that early period. Mr. Forbes was widely known as a man of the strictest integrity, whose word was as good as his bond, and was held in the highest esteem. For many years he was an elder in the Presbyterian church. His wife predeceased him five years ago.

He is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Wm. Archer and Mrs. Green, of Gables, and one son, Duncan Forbes, of Wallacetown.

The remains were taken to his late home on Friday where the funeral was held on Saturday to the McKillop cemetery, and was very largely attended. The services were conducted by Rev. Dr. Stalker, the bearers being James McKellar, M. Blue, J. C. Campbell, J. R. Gow, James Goodall and John R. Cameron.

DEATH OF MRS. HOLLAND

Was Resident of East Aldboro For Many Years

The death occurred at the home of her son, Rich. E. Holland, of Walkerville, on Thursday, of Mrs. Elizabeth Holland, widow of the late Geo. Holland, of East Aldboro, after an illness of two weeks with pneumonia. She was 80 years of age and a native of England, coming to Canada over 50 years ago and settling on Middle street, Aldboro. Several years ago she moved to West Lorne where her husband died. Latterly she has been making her home with her son in Walkerville. For many years she was a member of the Methodist church and held in the highest esteem in the community. She is survived by four sons: George and David, Mill street; Joseph R. and Rich. E., of Walkerville. The remains were taken to West Lorne on Saturday, the funeral taking place to Evergreen cemetery.

War Expenditures Still to Be Met From Proceeds of Victory Loan.

The war is over and won; but Canada's main expenditure for the war will not be complete until well on into 1920. The \$610,000,000 raised last year has all been spent, \$400,000,000 having been largely devoted to soldiers—to maintaining them, bringing them home, providing the necessary medical services, training them. Most of the balance of the loan was lent to Great Britain to enable her to buy our surplus products. And money is still necessary—for soldiers, for providing markets, for our surplus products, for the needs of reconstruction. And that is why another Victory Loan is necessary. 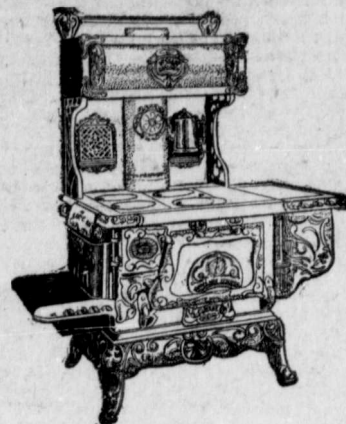
