

TERRIBLE ACCIDENT.

A French Cruiser's Boiler Blows Out. Scenes of Intense Suffering — Several Injured and Dying.

Brest, June 21.—A terrible accident occurred yesterday on board the new French cruiser, Dupuy De Lome, 6,300 tons. Orders had been given for the vesselto make a trial of her machinery and while this was in progress the end of one of the boilers was blown out, and the fire-room immediately became filled with scalding steam and suffocating smoke caused by the water reaching and extinguishing the fire under the boiler. A most horrible and sickening sight at once presented itself. Men were lying on deck delirious from agony caused by the terrible injuries they had sustained. Some were writhing in convulsions, their blackened and distorted faces and fearfully blistered bodies, arms and legs presenting a spectacle at once sickening and heartrending. The deck of the fire room was covered with hot water from the exploded boiler to the depth of two or three inches, and in this the injured men lay, every second adding to the terrible scalding they had received. Efforts were at once made to get the men out of the room. The hot water made it a difficult task, and finally it was found necessary to grasp them in any way and drag them out. Fiften of them were dying when they were taken to the ship's hospital and a number of others will undoubtedly die in a short time. It is believed that beside their external injuries nearly all inhaled steam. At the very time the end of the boiler blew out an explosion occurred in the coal bunkers and set the coal on fire. The flames, however, were soon got under control. The naval authorities will make a searching investigation into the causes of the accidents.
