

THE EMBARGO ON RYE.

Russia's Grain Duties Will Soriously
Affect Austria and Germany.
London, Aug. 12.—The Berlin Times
says: There is no chance of Chancellor
von Caprivi complying with the radical request to reduce the grain duties. The
Russian ukase will seriously affect Eastern
Prussia, which is almost entirely dependent upon Russian supplies. Ninety per
cent. of the foreign rye imported into Germany this year from January to July came
from Russia.

Sr. Petersburg, Aug. 12.—Such an extreme measure as prohibiting the exportation of rye has not been adopted in Russia since the Crimean war. The measure will scriously effect Austria and Germany, but not England or France, which import only white wheat.

Portuguese Barbarities.

London, Aug. 13.—Latest advices from southeastern Africa tell of appalling barbarities by the Portuguese with a view of bringing the natives to subjection. At Mozambique it is no uncommon thing to witness natives going about with heavy yokes about their necks, under which they can scarcely move. After enduring this torture for days some of them were beheaded and others sent back to carry terror to their tribes. The Portuguese have no hesitation in seizing the native women away from their families and making domestic slaves of them, while there is no doubt of collusion between the Portuguese and the Arab slave traders. Several of the latter, when captured by British war vessels, have confessed their relations with the Portuguese.

A St. Petersburg dispatch says relief measures for the distressed provinces are being rapidly pushed.

Bad crop prospects are reported in Bur-mah owing to drought. Cotton is a complete failure in many districts.

Enormous forest fires are raging in the vicinity of Toulon, France. Three thousand acres of forest near Toulon have been deartered. destroyed.

The rye imports by Germany from Russia cannot be replaced by the rye of any other country, and a rapid increase in the prices of breadstuffs must be expected. The general feeling is although Great Britain will not be affected to such an ex-tent as Germany and Austria by the Rus-sian edict prohibiting exportations of rye, she will inevitably suffer to a great extent. The concensus of opinion appears to be that the Russian Government has before it a problem far more troublesome for a time than getting rid of the Russian Jews. Famine is known to exist in five of the Provinces, while there is much distress in the remainder.
