A Gross Libel on London—Vivid Imagina-
tion of a New York Traveler.
[New York World, Oct. 2]

That convicts be placed at hard and un-
profitable labor so as not to compete with
honest toil, is often urged by the friends of
workmen. "I think the ideal of hard
and unprofitable labor is reached at Lon-
don, Ontario," said a commercial traveler
in the course of a conversation about prison-
made goods. "The workhouse and peni-
tentiary of Ontario is located upon the top
of a high bluff by the riverside. The con-
victs are told off into groups of four and
between them is a barrel with handles.
They fill it at the river side, and then
roll painfully up the steep path to the
summit of the bluff, where the contents of
the barrel are dumped into a gutter to rush
back into the river. Then they descend to
the water level for another load. The
warden who invented this solution of the
convict labor question had read of
Sisyphus and the stone when a schoolboy."

and it is believed that they are wanted in
other places.

sides the orchestral numbers, which have
been carefully selected by Mr. Roselle
Pococke, the services of Miss Marie Louise
Bailey, pianist to the King of Saxony,
have been secured. This in itself will
guarantee a good house, as Miss Bailey
stands pre-eminent as one of the greatest
pianists of the day. Mr. Angus, late of
Detroit, and a baritone of repute, will
turnish the vocal part of the programme.

Mr. A. C. Black's Case Dismissed.
Society in Dutton has been much exer-
cised over the arrest of one of its most
prominent and oldest citizens. Mr. A.
M. C. Black, who is said to have given
liberally of his means to assist in the
building of the Dutton High School, and
who has been for some ten years treasurer
of the school, was arrested at the in-
stance of James B. Crawford, merchant
of the village. It was alleged that Mr.
Black had stolen the funds of the
school. The evidence showed that
not only Mr. Black, but the man
who was appointed to succeed him as
treasurer, Mr. James B. Crawford, was
permitted to use the funds. Mr. Black
was a banker, and was required to give
security for the money and to pay all
checks of the board as they were presented.
Mr. Black failed in business, and his
sureties, who are perfectly good, have
been obliged to pay about \$1,000 on his
behalf. In this state of affairs Mr. Black
was arrested, and on Tuesday the evidence
of the prosecution was taken before Squires
Peter Stokker, S. B. Morris, Donald Turner
and Hugh McColl. The magistrates dis-
missed the case without Mr. Black offering
any evidence.

ANOTHER OUTRAGE.

It Also Was Perpetrated in Broad Day-
light and Near a Village—A
13-Year-Old Girl
the Victim.

BROCKVILLE, Oct. 25.—News has been
received here from Newboro, about 25
miles northwest of here, on the line of the
Brockville and Westport Railway, of a
brutal outrage perpetrated there on Mon-
day on the person of a girl named Annie
Cunning, 13 years of age. The girl had
been to a neighbor's house, a short dis-
tance north of the village, and was return-
ing home on the railway track when she
was met by a man and brutally
assaulted and outraged, under threats of
being killed if she revealed who her assail-
ant was. Under fear of the threat she at
first said it was a tramp who had so abused
her. When it became known so terrible a
crime had been committed in broad day-
light and close to the village, the greatest
excitement prevailed. The village bells
were rung to alarm the inhabitants, and the
people turned out en masse and secured
the country in all directions in hope of
capturing the perpetrator of the deed, but
without avail. The girl told several
conflicting stories last night, however.
About midnight she awoke her parents,
saying she could not go to sleep until
she had told the truth regarding the
matter. She then stated that her assailant
was a young man named Mac, Alford, a
resident of the village, that he had
threatened to kill her if she informed on
him, and for that reason she had told the
story about the tramp. Alford is the
son of a blacksmith in the village, and
the family is quite respectable. Alford
was at once arrested at his father's house
and the preliminary examination before a
magistrate is taking place at Newboro
this evening. He is about 20 years of age.
It is expected he will be brought to Brock-
ville jail today. From what can be learned
the girl was terribly injured. Doubts of
her recovery were at one time entertained,
but it is now thought she will recover.

THE BATTLE CREEK WRECK.

A Fiendish Confection—Soft-Soaped the
Track.

BATTLE CREEK, Mich., Oct. 25.—John
Bodwig, one of the men accused of wreck-
ing the Grand Trunk train at Battle Creek,
gave important testimony yesterday
against George Johnston. He told of
several meetings between himself, Jewett,
Johnston, Hall and Vedder, at which
train wrecking was fully discussed. Wit-
ness gave an account of the preparing of
the clabbar by himself and Knowles at the
railroad crossing tower house. After
several fruitless attempts at other places
they sneaked through a cornfield with it
and hid it in the grass near Mott street.
On the night of the wreck he went with
Hall and showed him where the bar was
hidden. Bodwig then declared he and Hall
separated leaving the bar in the grass. The
bar, however, was found next day near the
wreck and was undoubtedly the tool used
on a former occasion. Bodwig, Jewett,
Johnston and Vedder were to remove the
bolts with a wrench, pry up the rails with
saplings and soap the tracks. The first
three went to the scene of operations with a
roll of soap and a broom. Bodwig
acted as guard and patrolled the track.
The rails were soaped but he thinks Vidder
did not come with the wrench. The
examination adjourned for a month.

FOUND A FORTUNE

In an Old Cave—Gold Coin and Orna-
ments Worth \$3,000.

DURANGO, Mexico, Oct. 24.—While Jose
Maria Hurrer, was herding a flock of
sheep on the ranch of Julia Flores, 40 miles
west of here, Tuesday, he discovered a
cave which he partly explored. He found
stored in the cavern a box filled with gold
coin and ornaments valued at \$30,000. It
is supposed that it is a part of the ill-gotten
gains of Brigand Marz, who operated in
that section 30 years ago and was killed in
one of his expeditions. Ten per cent of the
amount goes to the Government.

Earthquake Shocks in California.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Oct. 24.—A very sharp
earthquake shock drove the people from
the large buildings at 3:57 p.m. yesterday.
No damage was done beyond the breaking
of windows. A telephone message from
Campo, a small town on the Mexican
border, 55 miles east, says the shock was
very severe there.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Oct. 24.—A slight
earthquake shock was felt on the streets
here at 3:05 p.m. yesterday.
