Will Labor Day and the Civic Holiday be Amalgamated?

News From Trades Union and Other Sources.

TRADES AND LABOR COUNCIL.

Regular meeting of Trades and Labor Council was held in the United Labor Hall, in the absence of President W. Todd, Vice-President James Cummings occupied the chair. Twelve organizations were represented.

Credentials received—Metal Polishers, Painters and Plasterers Union, W. Lyons, E. Gray and John Jackson; Typographical Union, John Fendegast; Shoemakers Union, Henry Arthur. Minutes of previous meeting read and approved.

Several standing committees submitted reports, which were adopted. The municipal committee—Messrs. H. Kene, J. Marks and J. Farrell—were instructed to wait on the water commissioners and ask that they pass the standard wage bylaw, which has been adopted by the City Council; also to bring before the City Council the question of amalgamating Civic Holiday with Labor Day.

A communication from the International Woodworkers' Union in reference to the formation of a union in this city was referred to the organization committee.

Delegate Joseph Hawthorne was elected corresponding secretary, and Delegate Frank McGee, sergeant-at-arms.

The council was informed that the Encyclopedia Britannica, which had been offered for sale in the city, was published by the Warner Company, whose publications were not patronized by the union printers.

The idea of a local labor bureau was discussed, and Delegate J. Hawthorne appointed to look after the interests of the council on the board.

The representatives to the charity organization society, suggested that the various city churches be asked to contribute the Thanksgiving Day collections to aid the society's work. The matter was left with the representatives to deal with.

Delegate Cummings brought up the question of the appointment of inspectors for the protection of persons employed in places other than factories. Action was deferred until next meeting.

The organization committee was instructed to proceed with the organization of the carriage and wagon workers and laundry employees.

Notice of motion that the municipal committee submit the names of one union man from each ward as candidate for alderman; and "that the school board be asked to provide technical education for girls in the public schools."

Adjourned until Tuesday, Oct. 23.

There are over 265 carpenters in the city.

It is claimed that there is not a non-union metal polisher in the city.

Frank Bieschke has taken out his card from the Cigarmakers' Union and left the city.

It is proposed to organize a directory of the Industrial Brotherhood in South London.

The building laborers will meet in Sherwood Hall. They were unable to secure a night in Labor Hall which would be satisfactory.

The Socialist Labor Party as a body will not co-operate with the Trades and Labor Council. Ministerial Association and W. C. T. U. for early closing.

The carriage and wagon workers will meet in Labor Hall on Friday, Oct. 25, at 8 o'clock, to consider the advisability of organizing a union. The organization committee of the T. and L. Council will be present to give any information desired.

GENERAL LABOR NOTES.

There are 300 idle printers in Chicago.

The stonework crafts are active in organizing again.

The printers chartered seven new unions last month.

Two A. R. U. unions were organized in Minneapolis.

The laundry drivers of Chicago have organized a union.

The strike of the upholsterers at Grand Rapids is still on.

Chicago printers' picnic for their unemployed netted over \$1,000.

Barbers of Minneapolis have formed a union with 87 charter members.

The large iron works at Pennsylvania have work for a year ahead.

The molders have issued twelve charters since their annual convention.

The new bicycle workers' national union starts out with 20,000 members.

Honolulu Typographical Union is the only labor organization on the Hawaiian Islands.

A union label league, composed of unions having a label, has been formed in Chicago.

The Plasterers' Union of Detroit has asked for an increase on their present scale of prices.

A union of printers has been formed at Green Bay, Wis., and a charter has been applied for.

A large number of unions of clerks have been formed in different cities since their late convention.

Street car unions of the east are considering the advisability of joining the Amalgamated Association.

Arrangements are now in progress for the manufacture of a lapel button to be worn by the printers.

Two hundred knee pants makers of New York won a strike recently for the renewal of last year's wage agreement.

San Francisco Typographical Union has appropriated \$2,000 for the assistance of unemployed members wishing to travel.

The bill posters and billers of Chicago have formed a union and obtained a charter from the American Federation of Labor.

The American Watch Company at Waltham, Mass., granted the increase in wages asked by their employees and a strike was averted.

All the tool makers at the Toledo bicycle factories, with one exception, struck at noon last Thursday. A general strike is probable.

The Calumet Iron and Steel Company of Irondale, Ill., recently opened their shops for the first time in three years. The works employ 1,000 men.

The coal miners at Little Muddy and Coalby's mine at Percy, Ill., are on strike for a 10 per cent advance. It is said that others will follow.

Over 100 weavers employed in the manufacture of turkey red cloth and damasks at Philadelphia are on strike for an increase of 10 per cent in wages.

The reed and rattan workers of Chicago have begun a campaign to in-

crease their wages to somewhere near those paid to skilled workmen in other trades.

The United Labor League of Western Pennsylvania, with headquarters at Pittsburgh, is one of the largest and strongest central labor organizations in the country.

The watch factory at Elgin, Ill., will hereafter work six days per week instead of five as formerly. This means an increase of \$13,000 in the monthly pay roll.

The striking spinners of the American Linen Company of Fall River have voted to resume work under a promise from the agent that the work and wages will be improved.

Government figures show that in England 9,750 union working people received increases in wages in August, and the month previous 114,500 received a raise. About 700 gained eight hours in August.

The financial statement published by the American Federation of Labor shows a cash balance on hand Aug. 1 of \$2,230; receipts for August, \$83,95; expenditures, \$1,338.98, leaving a balance of \$1,763.97.

An international union of textile workers has been formed. The craftsmen, many, France and Austria, to the number of 189,400 are represented. Headquarters have been established at Ghent, Belgium.

The American Federation of Labor has branched out into new fields. A charter has been issued to a St. Paul educational club. There are similar clubs in other parts of the country engaged in discussing the question of affluence.

Employees in the finishing departments of the Pittsburgh, Pa., iron works have received a 2 per cent increase of wages for September and October. It is expected that at the next monthly settlement wages of both pudlons and finishers will go up 4 per cent more.

The teamsters on the Beverley street (Toronto) macadam pavement struck this week because the contractor wanted them to haul in seven loads of stone and haul out seven loads of earth per day at 45 cents per double load. Six double loads at 50 cents they regard as a fair day's work.

Iron molders instructed their national officers to purchase and construct foundries from such funds of the union as can best be spared, and they are to be established and operated in the name of the Iron Molders' Union of North America, to be conducted under the direction of a board of directors appointed by the national president.

For the first six months of 1913, 201 new woolen, cotton, silk and knitting mills were established in the United States. The textile industry is second only to iron in its revival during 1913.

Great Britain is this year enjoying a great boom in cotton mills and other industries.

It is announced that the Clark Thread Company of Newark, N. J., will start a cost price restaurant for its employees within a few days, reasoning that if its employees are better nourished the company will be the gainer in getting better work. As will be seen, there is more to it than meets the eye.

At the conference held in Pittsburgh between the soft coal miners and operators regarding uniformity of rates it was decided that the rates agreed upon Aug. 2 should remain in force until Dec. 31, namely, 64 cents, where wages are paid in cash, and 69 where the company stores exist. The committee further decided that all company stores shall be abolished by the convention. The report was adopted by the convention. Another joint convention of operators and miners will be held Dec. 3, to agree upon mining rates for 1914.

The shipbuilding industry on the Clyde is at present very brisk. Orders are plentiful and the various artisans are all making good wages. During September the Scotch shipbuilders launched 37 vessels of 39,017 tons, which 20 of 35,412 tons were steamers, 2 of 3,200 tons sailing barges, and 6 of 385 tons sailing barges. To the total the Clyde contributed 27 steamers of 3,612 tons and 3 sailers of 3,255 tons; the Forth 5 sailing barges of 250 tons; and the Dee 2 steamers of 2,800 tons.

In a statistical report published by the Typographical Journal there are 2-15 typesetting machines in operation, with 2,368 operators. The machine operators, with the exception of 390, are members of the International Typographical Union. Three unions are working 60 hours per week, while 125 make 48

hours or less; 13 42, and 2 6 hours per day. Seven unions have a nine-hour workday. On hand composition 309 unions, 59 hours or less constitute a week's work, and nineteen have eight hours. In 133 unions 59 hours constitute a week's work and 56 have 60 hours.

The past week was the nineteenth week of the Detroit cigarmakers' strike. The members of the union have been active in distributing their literature on the cause of the strike, and are hopeful that they will ultimately be victorious. During the week contributions ranging from \$5 to \$100 have been received from various sources, while a large number of labor organizations have levied assessments to help the cigarmakers in their fight against child labor. At a meeting held in Port Huron on Thursday night 1,000 citizens expressed their sympathy for the Detroit cigarmakers and pledged their support by purchasing union-made cigars. Fully 7,000 tickets have been sold for the sacred concert to be held tomorrow in aid of the strikers.

CHILDREN'S AID SOCIETY.

The Annual Meeting and Election of Officers.

Interesting Reports From the Agent and the Secretary—Three Inhuman Fathers Sent to the Central.

The annual meeting of the Children's Aid Society was held yesterday afternoon in Somerset Hall, with the following ladies and gentlemen present:

T. R. Parker (president), Clara Powell (secretary), W. H. Wortman, Prof. Harrison, T. H. Luscombe, Fred Matthews, Inspector Sanders, Andrew Thompson, Mrs. J. W. Jones, Mrs. Talbot Macbeth, Mrs. Charles Hutchinson, Mrs. Andrew Morphy, Mrs. John Beattie, Mrs. E. E. Leonard, Mrs. J. J. Hunt (treasurer), and Miss Long.

The annual report of the secretary and agent was very interesting. It read in part as follows:

The society this year has placed in first-class homes ten children, and returned two to their parents. The children placed out have been visited many times, and have in all cases been doing most comfortably situated and very kindly treated. There have been fourteen children on hand for adoption.

The agent of the society, Mr. Joseph Sanders, has visited over 50 families, during the year, some of the families who have made him a most welcome visitor, and even more. Through his efforts and threats to set the machinery of the courts in motion he has made that number of homes more fit for children to live in.

"The agent's visits have brought to light some almost incredible cases of depravity and destitution. Three cases of almost inhuman brutality have been ventilated in the courts, and the fathers and husbands—if such they could be called—have each been sent to the Central Prison for very long terms.

One of the children over whom the society has exercised a watchful eye for some time, and whose traveling party, taken by Mr. Sanders, was most notorious, has been traveling somewhat again this year, but happily shows considerably less desire to wander."

Three boys brought up for stealing were given a severe warning and were let go on promise of reformation. Two of these boys had shown very great improvement. One, however, seemed to have a severe warning and was sent to the reformatory. The society ran across two visitors from Brantford, boys about 14 years old. Both were taken by Mr. Sanders to the Mount Hope Orphanage, where one is now apparently well satisfied with his quarters. The other boy ran away and is supposed to have gone back to Brantford.

Too much praise could not be given to the two orphan homes for their kindness. The Protestant Orphans' home has twelve children placed there by the society, of which two are now at Chatham township. Two children have been placed in the Mount Hope Orphanage, where they are being kindly kept without charge.

The thanks of the society were tendered to the "Advertiser" Free Press Catholic Record and county papers for reports and assistance. The growing desire of the chief of police to render assistance to the society was noted with great pleasure. Honorary mention was tendered to Mr. Frank Cooper, photographer, and Messrs. Magee, McKillop & Murphy, solicitors.
