Trek Once More Free State Government Must Get Out of Kroonstad.

Boers About to

Roberts' Troopers Close on Their Heels-Canadians in Recon noitering Found the Enemy in Force at Zand River-British Occupy Fourteen Streams-Roberts' Rapid Advance Demoralizes the Boers and Alarms

the Rebel Colonists.

London, Wednesday, May 9-4:10 a. moralizing the Boers, but is striking the Four thousand Ruitish cayalry terror into the rebel colonists." m.-Four thousand British cavalry watered their horses at Zand River Monday, 25 miles beyond Smaldeel, where Lord Roberts continues to date his dispatches. The scouts, who have been searching the country for miles along the stream, have found no Boers south of the river. The enemy are laagered in unknown force on the north bank. Thus the British advance guard

are within 45 miles of Kroonstad. The Free Staters, in the expectation that Kroonstad will soon speedily become untenable, are, according to information from Lorenzo Marquez, preparing to transfer their government to Heilbron, a little more than 50 miles northeast.

SMALDEEL. Smaldeel is a village of only a score of dwellings, but it expanded in one night to a vast canvas city, and the glow of the camp fires was like a scene in an iron smelting district. The city is likely to fade away in a day by the immediate progress of the in-

fantry to Zand River. Some exasperation is expressed by correspondents at the ease with which the Boers escape with their transports before the very eyes of the Brit-ish. Zand River, and found the enemy in considerable force. "Gen. Broadwood's brigade of cavalry, with Gen. Ian Hamilton's force, performed the same operations with much the same result.

BRITISH HOLD FOURTEEN STREAMS. "Gen. Hunter reports that he occupied Fourteen Streams yesterday without opposition, owing, in a great measure, to the able dispositions made by Gen. Paget on the left bank of the Vaal River at Warrenton, where his artillery fire rendered the enemy's position practically untenable. A six-inch gun was found most useful. When the 6th and half of the 5th brigades of infantry advanced under cover of the artillery the enemy retired precipitately, abandoning their clothing, ammunition and personal effects."

relief cannot be expected at the earliest before May 18. It seems possible, however, that the siege may continue till June. The commissariat has begun to make horseflesh sausages. A new Boer laager has appeared near the southwestern outposts. Fever is spread-

"The besieged are celebrating the two hundredth day of the siege with horse dinners. Col. Baden-Powell sent a message to Lord Roberts, saying:
'After two hundred days of siege I desire to bring to your lordship's notice the exceptionally good spirit of loyalty which pervades all classes of the garrison and the patience of everybody. Mafeking is making the best of things under the long strain of anxlety, hardship and privation. The men, half of whom are The men, half of whom are not accustomed to the use of arms, have adapted themselves to their duties with the greatest zeal and readiness. The pluck and devotion of the women have been remark-With such spirits our organization runs like clockwork. I have every hope it will pull us through.

EMPTY STOMACH. London, May 9-4:30 a.m.—The tid-ings from Mafeking are gloomier than ever. Everybody there has an empty stomach and a pinched face. The natives are no longer given even porridge, and the whites now have nothing but a quart of that sub-stance, and a pound of horse-sausage Everything else eatable has Insufficient food, wet trenches daily. and cold nights are deadly to the health of the garrison. This informa-tion comes from reliable natives. Lady Sarah Wilson, under date of April 27, says: "The Boers now num-

ber 4,500, including young Eloff, President Kruger's grandson, who has sent for six more guns." GLOOMY FOREBODINGS. A Mafeking correspondent of the Times, who also emphasizes the extreme gravity of the situation, says: It is impossible to ignore the fatal signifi-cance of Col. Baden-Powell's reference to the hardships endured by the women and children, among whom many deaths have already occurred. The commis-sariat is holding a certain stock of food in reserve for use in the direst

THE RELIEF COLUMN. The British column is reported to have reached Taunga, thirty miles north of Warrenton. According to Pretoria advices, the British are nearing Vryburg, which is half-way between Warrenton and Mafeking. Gen. Hunter's force embraces 20,000 infantry and 5,000 to 6,000 horsemen, an army far greater than has hitherto

peen supposed. While the relief column is mov-ing towards Vryburg, Gen. Hunter is apaprently preparing an orderly advance northeast, along the Vaal River, to participate in the Pretoria advance as Lord Roberts' left flank.

PRAISED BY ROBERTS. London, May 8. - The Gazette this evening contains a dispatch from Lord Roberts, inclosing Kekewich's report on the operations at Kimberley. Lord Roberts pays his tribute to the tact, judgment and resolution of Col. He was on March 30 in the hospital at Kimberley with two wounds-one through the lung and the other through the left arm. He was in Roberts' Horse on the march to the relief of Kimberley, and was wound-ed in action near that city Lord Roberts shook hands with him, and congratulated him on his escape. From the Klondike to Kimberley is a far way, and Wasson is one of the few soldiers of the Queen who traveled more than half way round the world

at his own charge to get a chance of fighting.
