It has been in only recent years that she has come to the fore prominently. But now she holds the center of the stage in the majority of the colleges for women, and her physical well-being is as carefully looked after as her mental education.

The improvement shown by the girl athletes since competent and experienced physical directors have been secured to look after their training has been marked. and presages much more remarkable

ed, and presages much more remarkable improvement in the future, as the com-ing generation of girls shows the fullness of strength and health as the direct result of being the children of mothers devoted to athletics and athletic culture.

It was not so long ago that a girl who would climb trees, jump fences, play ball and take enjoyment in boyish sports was put down as being a "Tomboy," a hoy-dent, and was looked at askance by her girl friends and acquaintances.

Now, however, everything has changed, and it is the bashful, retiring girl, who neither runs, jumps or plays basket ball and other sports, who is the one who is looked upon as being "so strange."

Vassar has always been progressive and foremost in edvancing the physical de-Vassar has always been progressive and foremost in advancing the physical development of her students; and now the institution, the oldest American college for women, sees its reward. Vassar has added a new trophy to acclaim her supremacy as having the champion allround girl athlete of the country.

Margaret Calhoun, '01, rounded out her previous successes of a four years' course by winning the all-round athletic championship of her college.

The physical test of the college was very thorough, and the contestants were put

thorough, and the contestants were put through the same tests that Yale and Harvard men perform in contests for the title of strong men—lifting with the arms, back and legs; clearing the bar and flying ring exercise. Miss Calhoun won easily. While Miss Calhoun has won the title of "Vassar strong girl and all-round best athlete," still there are other students who excel the champion at other sports

Julia Belden Lockwood, '01. of Norwalk, Conn., was the best hurdler of the college. She holds the Vassar record for the 120-yard hurdles—21 2-5 seconds. Miss Lockwood has a perfect style in taking the jump, and is as graceful as a fawn. Louisa Summer Holmquist, also of the class of '01, and of New York, is Vassar's class of '01, and of New York, is Vassar's champion sprinter. Her record for the 100-yard dash is 13 4-5 seconds.

Isabel Adams, '98, has the record for the 220-yard dash. She covered the distace in exactly 34 seconds.
