SAVED BY RUSSIANS.

Brussels, Dec. 19.-The following dispatch, dated Vladivostock, Dec. 18, has been received at the headquarters of the Scheut missions here: "In the district of Pins all our interests have been entirely destroyed, except the Episcopal residence. The bishops, 19 Belgian missionaries, 4 Chinese priests and 3,000 Christians were saved by Russian troops arriving in haste in five columns. Commander Eletz, with a flying column, arrived first, Oct. 28, and made a heroic defense for five days. During the terrible siege he lost in dead and wounded one-third of his force. Although twice wounded he refused to leave his post until the arrival of reinforcements.

MISSIONARIES KILLED. Boston, Dec. 19.—News has been received by Prof. Fridolf Risberg, at the Scandinavian Alliance Mission of North America, from Missionary N. J. Fridstrom, in China, that all the Scandinavian missionaries to Mongolia are killed, and among them Carl Johann Suber, of Boston.


## MAN-HUNTING IN THE SUNNY SOUTH

She was knocked down, and the wheels of the car went over her legs, nearly severing them at the knee. She was taken to the hospital, where she died a short time after her admittance.
