HER SKIRT SAVED A TRAIN TORONTO'S LOSS

BY FIRE \$300,000

Which Otherwise Would Have Dashed Into Washout.

Brother Got Her to Take It Off and Waved the Red Signal.

Poughkeepsie, N. Y., July 11.—Eldridge Finkle, a 15-year-old farmer boy, went out with his 13-year-old sister Mary to pick wild blackberries near Boston Corners.

"Oh, Mary, look at that rail!" suddenly exclaimed the boy, as he pointed to a place where the recent rains had washed the dirt from under three or four ties.

"Don't you see how the ties have settled and how much further that rail is from the other one than it is back there and there beyond?"

"Hush," commanded her brother. "That's the train from Poughkeepsie blowing at the crossing, and if that strikes that rail it will go down the bank; we must stop it."

"Take off your red skirt quick," he told her; she hesitated, the boy began to unbuckle the gown and then, realizing that human lives depended upon her, the girl quickly took off the skirt and Eldridge ran with it up the track, waving the dress above his head to warn the engineer.

"Two hundred feet from the menacing place he stopped the train. The engineer and trainmen got out and the boy told them of the danger and then, realizing that the train had used for the danger signal until they saw the boy go up to the girl, who was partly hidden by a clump of bushes, hand her the skirt and heard him say, 'Put on your dress and let's go home.'"

The trainmen fixed the rail so that the train could run over it, and before the excitement subsided the children, with their pair of berries, had disappeared.

THE LOSSES.

The chief losses are: H. McIntosh & Sons, stock of grain, etc., \$40,000; grain, \$20,000; in the Royal and \$10,000 in the Atlas.

Toronto Railway, building, assessed at \$3,000,000; loss on crockery, \$20,000; insurance \$17,500, distributed as follows: Gore, \$5,000; Canadian, \$3,000; London Mutual, \$3,500; Traders, \$3,000; American and Perth Mutual, \$2,000 each.

Ontario Binder Twine Company, loss on twine in store, \$10,000; insured in Atlas for \$5,000; and in Lancashire, \$5,000; and Ottawa, \$1,000.

Wilson Bros., wool dealers, loss \$15,000 in wool; fully covered.

Gadsby & McCann, loss \$4,000; insurance \$1,500, in North British and Mercantile.

Calbert & Dwyer, loss in wool \$3,500; fully insured in British America.

J. E. Bailey, provisions, loss \$2,500; fully insured in Norwich Union.

John Hallam, wool, loss \$2,000; covered by London and Lancashire.

There are some firms with goods in probably the largest storage warehouse in Toronto, and the loss will be about \$7,000. The stock is a complete loss. It was valued at about \$65,000; fully covered by insurance. The details of insurance could not be learned, as the papers were in the store vault, which was not approachable this evening.

Grafton & Co.'s clothing store, immediately in rear of the Pratt building, lost \$20,000 worth of goods and removal of stock; fully insured.

Blaze Was Confined to the Pratt Building—Loss \$7,000.

Hamilton, Ont., July 10.—The fire in the departmental store of the T. H. Pratt Company today was fully under control at 3 o'clock, and a couple of hours later was completely extinguished.

The fire originated where waste paper was being burned in a furnace, and was discovered by a lady clerk after it had attained good headway. It spread with great rapidity to the third story, where the eastern end of the building was located, and on account of the dense smoke the firemen were unable to gain admission to the building, and had to be content for two hours in fighting the fire from the windows in front and rear.

The fire was confined to the Pratt building, which is owned by T. H. Pratt, and is damaged to the extent of about \$7,000. The stock is a complete loss. It was valued at about \$65,000; fully covered by insurance. The details of insurance could not be learned, as the papers were in the store vault, which was not approachable this evening.

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WOMAN SAVED TWO LIVES

Youth and Boy in Imminent Peril of Drowning

When Mrs. Simpson Leaped Into the River to Save Them.

New York, July 11.—Mrs. Thomas Simpson, who with her husband, conducted a public bathhouse at the foot of Fifteenth street, Hoboken, rescued from drowning John Campbell, jun., 11 years old, of No. 1,102 Washington street, and William McDermott, 17 years old, also of Hoboken.

Campbell is the son of Chief Officer John Campbell, of the steamship St. Louis.

The boy went in the morning with his mother to visit his aunt, Mrs. Edw. Miller, who is the wife of the captain of the barge Birmingham, lying at the Fifteenth street pier. Young Campbell was playing about the barge when he made a misstep and fell overboard.

McDermott, who was on the pier, saw the boy fall and plunged into the water after him. Campbell sank, but McDermott lived after him and brought him to the surface. The boy struggled in his fright and young McDermott had great trouble in keeping his head above water.

The youth was nearly exhausted, and he and the child were in danger of being carried under the Fourteenth street pier, when Mrs. Simpson went to their rescue. She did not wait to take off her shoes, nor any of her clothing, but jumped into the water just as she was and struck out for the drowning pair. She is an expert swimmer, and soon reached McDermott and the child.

She got hold of McDermott with her left hand and then made for the Fifteenth street pier. McDermott still holding on to the child. After a hard struggle she reached the Fifteenth street pier, where two sailors from the brick schooner New York hauled McDermott and the little boy out of the water. Mrs. Simpson also was lifted from the river.

Young Campbell was unconscious, but he revived after Dr. Wolff, who had been called, had worked over him for an hour.

Mrs. Simpson is known as an expert swimmer. Two years ago her husband, who is also a fine swimmer, struck his head against a pile while in the water and became unconscious. He was saved by his wife.

GAME TO LAST FIVE YEARS

One Man in Ohio and One in Russia Playing Chess for \$5,000.

Canton, Ohio, July 11.—One man in Canton and another in Warsaw, Russia, are engaged in a game of chess which, it is estimated, will require five years to finish, as it is being conducted by mail, and it requires fourteen days for a letter to pass between the two players.

The game was prompted by Charles Rosenblum, of Charkoff, a wealthy Russian, who is closely related to both contestants. He has put up a purse of 10,000 rubles (about \$5,000) for the game, three-fourths to go to the winner and one-fourth to the loser. Four moves have already been made.

Nun Weds Grocer's Clerk.

Syracuse, N. Y., July 11.—Sister Rita, a Sister of Charity for 17 years, married a grocer's clerk six months ago, but the fact has just been made public. While in charge of the Assumption asylum Sister Rita met daily Patrick Keating when he came to get orders for groceries. They often chatted and the friendship thus formed soon ripened into love.

Bishop McQuaid, of Rochester, gave a special dispensation absolving Sister Rita from her vows. They became man and wife last night. He and the couple are living happily here. She is 30 years of age and the groom 20.

All the occupants were thrown out and the auto wrecked. The three men suffered from contusions. They were taken to Angus Inn, where a carriage was summoned, in which they were driven to their homes.

BITTEN BY MAD DOG

Gallant Canadian Officer Dies From Hydrophobia.

Ottawa, July 11.—Particulars were received yesterday from the British Secretariat of the death of Capt. A. E. Raistrick, of the Southern Nigerian Regiment, of the West African frontier force. Capt. Raistrick was formerly an officer in the 5th Highland Rifles. His mother resides in Hamilton. He went to West Africa in 1900, and from the tenor of Mr. Chamberlain's dispatch was highly esteemed by his brother officers for gallant and effective work. In a little over a year he was in action no fewer than seven times. Early in June Capt. Raistrick arrived in England on six months' leave, and shortly after landing took sick in London. It was thought at first he was suffering from west coast fever, but three doctors diagnosed the case as hydrophobia of a pronounced type, and on June 11 the poor fellow passed away in great agony. He was interred in the Richmond Cemetery on July 18 with military honors.

The dispatch says that previous to his death the gallant young Canadian mentioned to a brother officer that he had been bitten by a mad dog in West Africa about three months ago. Mr. Chamberlain asks that the sincere condolences of his Majesty's Government be conveyed to the relatives of the deceased.

A Hamilton Bookkeeper Missing.

Hamilton, Ont., July 11.—J. C. McKeand, who has been the trusted bookkeeper for E. T. Wright & Co. for the past nine years, has been missing since last week, and an examination of his books shows a large shortage in his accounts.

E. T. Wright says he believes McKeand is in the United States and will likely stay there. The exact amount of his defalcation cannot be stated until a complete audit of the books has been made, but it is estimated at over \$5,000.

Died at Age of 126.

Knoxville, Tenn., July 11.—Ferry Chesney, the oldest man in Tennessee, and perhaps the oldest in the United States, died at his home on the east side of Copper Ridge on July 4 at the age of 126 years, the day of his death being his birthday. Chesney was born in Virginia on July 4, 1788, and, as a slave, belonged to Jonathan Jackson, of Clarksville, on the Roanoke River. When 12 years old he saw George Washington. It was four days after his death that his body was discovered.
