

Why the Court of Dresden Wants Princess Divorced.

WON'T COURTESY TO VICEREINE

Decision Reached by English Ladies of Title-Fifty-Eight Men Perish in a Mine.

Dresden, Jan. 2. - The court of Dresden has telegraphed to the court of Vienna requesting prompt action in the matter of divorcing the Crown Princess of Saxony. The court's desire apparently is to secure this divorce quickly, as owing to the condition of the Queen, the unwelcome possibility of the princess becoming queen menaces the kingdom.

TLED. Delhi, Jan. 2 .- Great discussion has occurred among the numerous ladies of title in the durbar camp whether they ought to courtesy to Lady Curzon at the public ceremonies. It has been fin-ally desided that these courtesies shall not be made at the embassy. This decision is in strict accordance with the English court etiquette. The wife of the viceroy is often erroneously called vicereine, but she has not any official rank, and so is not accorded the salutes and public honors given her hus-

PONDEROUS QUESTION SET-

St. Petersburg, Jan. 1. — Fifty-eight lives were lost in the recent fire in a

coal mine at Bachmut, Ykatorinos-lay province. Eleven men were rescued, after having been sixty hours in the mine. Twenty-one others were sayed after five days' imprisonment. NEW YEARS' DAY IN PARIS. Paris, Jan. 2. — The new year reception at the Elysee Palace was at-

tended by the foreign diplomats, Government officials and members of the Chamber of Deputies. The diplomats were presented to President Loubet by the dean of the corps, Mgr. Rinaldini, the apostolic nuncio, who made a speech, in which he conveyed the good wishes of the foreign repre-sentatives to the first magistrate of the republic. He referred to the sympathy which the entire world entertained for France, saying this sympathy had been particularly express-

ed in the condolences concerning the Martinique disaster.

In his reply, President Loubet said he commenced the new year with the feelings of human brotherhood, which this disaster had evoked. The President afterwards talked for some time with the different representatives.

UNITED STATES EMBASSY AT ROME INJURED. Rome, Jan. 2 .- As the result of collision between the carriage of Secretary Iddings, of the United States, embassy here, and an electric street car last night, Mr. Iddings' shoulder was dislocated, his coachman was injured slightly, and the carriage was smashed. The coachman, seeing the imminence of the danger, lashed the Thursday. Senor Corona then walked quietly away and was not arrested.

TURKS WORSTED. Constantinople, Jan. 2. - In a recent fight between Bulgarians and Turkish troops at the Village of Drenovo, in the Monastir district, 15 of the latter were killed or wounded. The Turkish commander was among the killed. The Bulgarians, who were barricaded in a house, also sustained losses, but the survivors escaped.
