ESTEEMED CITIZEN DEAD

Demise of Mr. Jonathan Magee of This City.

Member of Well-Known Family Dies After Long Illness.

One of London's best-known and highly-respected citizens was removed by the death of Jonathan Magee, which occurred at the family residence on Wednesday night after an illness lasting for several weeks.

Mr. Magee was widely-known in this city, and although his illness had been a serious one, and it was known that he might not recover, his many friends were shocked to learn of his death.

Mr. Magee was the third son of the late G. G. Magee, and was a cousin of Mr. James Magee, K.C., county crown attorney. He was born 54 years ago in this city and had lived in this vicinity all his lifetime. For a time he engaged in farming near Crumlin. During the last few years he lived retired in this city.

Mrs. Magee and two daughters, Misses Edith and Hattie, the former of whom is studying music in New York, survive him, with Mrs. Mary A. Magee, his mother, his sister Miss Magee, both of this city, and two brothers, Guy of Chicago, and A. R., of London Township. Mr. Guy Magee, who has been at his brother's bedside for some time, is well-known to Canadian and American newspapermen, having worked on local papers and on the more important of Chicago's dailies.

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
