

BIG SALE OF THOROUGHBREDS REALIZED OVER EIGHT THOUSAND

**Shorthorns From Well-Known
Stock Farms Were Sold by
Auction—Good Prices.**

One of the most important sales of thoroughbred cattle held in this section in many years took place at the fair grounds yesterday afternoon, when nearly 50 Shorthorns were offered from the farms of Edward C. Attili, Ridgewood Park, Goderich; Capt. Tom Robson, Ilfracombe; Mr. Wm. Doherty, Clinton; Mr. James Crear, Shakespeare; and Mrs. Alex. Marr, Goderich.

Owing to ill-health, Mr. Attili has found it necessary to dispose of his stock, and the bulk of the animals sold yesterday were Scotch and Scotch-forded Shorthorns, contributed by him, the selected drafts from the other breeders being smaller in number. The sale attracted a large number of buyers from all parts of the west, and good prices were realized. Mr. A. M. Hunt and Capt. Robson were the hammer.

Forty-two head were bought up, 27 being from Ridgewood Park. The total amount realized was \$8,450, or an average of \$122 each. The highest figure of the day was paid for a Lady Hope, 4 years old, who was bought by Prof. Day for the Ontario Agricultural College. The price was \$550. The second highest figure—\$550—was paid by Col. McGillivray, of Toronto, for Missie, 16th, a roan, 7 years old, brought over from \$300 and under \$400, the remainder going for less than \$500 each. The 27 head from Ridgewood Park brought \$2,750; 3 head from Capt. Robson, \$1,450; 3 head from Mr. Crear's, \$450; 3 head from Mr. Doherty's, \$215, and 1 head from Mrs. Marr's, \$165. With much perspiration and endeavor they had caused the calf to traverse a certain road, when the wife, when Mrs. Marshall, owner of the said calf, butted in.

John told her of the destination of the bovine, and he and his helpmate started on the journey forthwith.

Mrs. Marshall hurried to the scene of action, and then it all happened. She reached for her calf, and John is said to have reached for her. Gentle twinnings were barred, and Marquis of Huckleberry rules were relegated to a rear pew. John and his helpmate Martha are alleged to have taken a few punches at Mrs. Marshall, and the last-mentioned is also said to have been kicked.

CHANGED PLEA OF NOT GUILTY

**Alex. Gooding Admitted Two
Offenses—Moving Vans Are
Not to Block Walks.**

Alexander Gooding changed his plea of not guilty on charges of fraud and theft, before Police Magistrate Love, this morning, and admitted his guilt in both cases. He was bailed to appear on Nov. 18, and in the meantime he must make complete restitution. A warrant was issued by Mr. Trafford of King Street, for his arrest for converting to his own use \$10 75 which he had collected for him. Mr. Tripp, shoe repairer, also charged Gooding with obtaining two second-hand pairs of shoes, worth \$1.50, under false pretences.

The magistrate did not intend to imprison Gooding if the latter would make amends. Leniency was shown him for the sake of his wife and children, rather than for himself. He was guilty of a breach of trust, of betraying the confidence put in him by his employer, and this was one of the most serious offenses.

"But you do not suffer for your misdeeds," said the court. "It's your wife and children who suffer. It's always the wives and children that suffer for the husbands' and fathers' misdeeds."

PERMIT SYSTEM IS INEFFICIENT

**Many Flaws In It Leave the
Engineer Helpless.**

BUILDINGS ERECTED THIS YEAR

**Supposed to Total in Value Nearly
Half a Million Dollars—Some
Big Contracts.**

The inefficiency of the present system of granting building permits is shown up by the fact that since Jan. 1 of this year, but 166 were issued from the city engineer's office. These totaled but the sum of \$22,260.

Despite these figures local builders and architects say that the building work in London will amount this year to \$400,000 or \$500,000.

At present it is well known that a great many houses are erected for which permits are not secured, and there is no law which compels people to take out a permit. There is no penalty for failing to do so.

Neither has the city engineer power to compel those who take out permits to give him an estimate of the cost of the building, and the figures given above are from the estimates of the city engineer's office.

Consequently they may be right and they may be out thousands of dollars.

It is a noticeable fact that but few factory permits were taken out this year. For the most part the permits were for residences. The majority of these were issued by the city engineer, and a few at \$2,500, a few reaching \$3,500.

Two large factory permits were taken out. The Denzil Wire and Iron Works is putting up a building costing about \$20,000.

The other factory permit was for the big planing mills to be erected on Rectory street, the cost of which will run, for the buildings alone, about \$15,000.

The Bank of Commerce building is one of the largest jobs undertaken this year, and it is estimated that the structure will cost when finished about \$35,000 or \$40,000.

The new warehouse of D. H. Howden & Co., on York street, will cost in the neighborhood of \$50,000.

On Carling's Heights is also being constructed the new stores building, to cost about \$20,000.

The Adelaide Street Baptist Church is also under construction. The cost of this year over last of \$40,000, or more will be spent on the new Sunday school of St. Andrew's Church. Chalmers Church congregation also contemplate a new edifice, but it may not be commenced this year. The cost will be about \$12,000 or \$15,000.

The Lennox Railway Company is also erecting a new office on Dundas street east, to cost about \$5,000.

The estimate of about \$500,000 as the value of the buildings erected in London this year appears reasonable.

Assessment Commissioner Grant's figures showed an increase in realty values this year over last of \$40,000. The assessment of the city as a whole showed an increase of over a million and a half, but of this sum \$679,251 was secured from increased taxes.

In the engineer's office it was said today that the permits taken out represented about 60 per cent of the buildings erected, and that this morning Mr. Weyler's figures represent about 60 per cent of the cost of the new structures.

Deceased was a native of Germany, was 78 years of age, and came to this country 48 years ago, having lived ever since in the vicinity of Delaware. She was highly respected by all who knew her. Her husband predeceased her nearly three years ago.

Five daughters—Maria, Annie, Rebecca, Eliza, at home, and Mrs. Maggie Smith, Carleton, and one son, Mr. C. Weyler, of Delaware, survive. The funeral will be held on Monday at 1 o'clock to Lambeth Cemetery. Rev. Mr. Leitch, of the Presbyterian Church, Delaware, will conduct the services.
