

MAY PROCLAIM MARTIAL LAW IN VIRGINIA

Federal Troops Will Likely Be Sent To The Mining Districts.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30.—President Harding in a proclamation late today commanded all persons engaged in "unlawful and insurrectionary proceedings" in the West Virginia coal fields to disperse and retire peacefully to their homes before noon on Thursday, September 1.

Unless there is prompt compliance, the administration let it be known that martial law would be declared and Governor Morgan's appeal for federal troops granted.

Held Conference. The proclamation was issued by the president after a day of conference with Secretary Weeks, Gen. Bandholtz and Major-Gen. Harbor, assistant chief of staff. A West Virginia delegation was also in conference with the president and Secretary Weeks and strongly urged the immediate dispatch of troops to the scene of the trouble.

Intimation was given by administration officials that if troops were sent there would be an adequate force and that "there will be no child's play."

COMMANDER TRAIN. CHARLESTON, W. Va., Aug. 30.—Extraordinary preparations went forward today and continued tonight, following reports of a gathering of armed men at Jeffery, in the adjacent county of Boone. Reports of a gathering of armed men at Jeffery, in the adjacent county of Boone, were received from hundreds of thousands. Lack of telephone communication with Jeffery precluded confirmation of figures.

Fearing that the men would cross the hills to the Logan County side, companies of ex-service men were being formed today to reinforce detachments of deputy sheriffs and state police now guarding the border. In this little town, the county seat, a battalion drilled throughout the afternoon. Additional forces of former soldiers were reported to be coming from Welch and McDowell.

No word has been received from Adjutant-Gen. John H. Charnock, who left Charleston today on a special train for the "district of uncertainty" on the east slope of Spruce Fork Ridge, separating Logan County from Boone.

A special train, one coach of which was loaded with arms and ammunition, arrived here at 7 o'clock tonight from Charleston. The munitions were guarded by deputies.

EXPECT CREDITS WILL BE EFFECTIVE SOON

DEVLIN'S DEATH MAKES SEVENTH SENATE VACANCY

Liberal Member For Wright County Dies At Montreal.

MONTREAL, Aug. 30.—E. B. Devlin, M.P. for Wright County, Que., died this evening at 6:15 in the Hotel Dieu Hospital here from uraemia, which attacked him suddenly some six weeks ago.

There were present at his death his wife and two daughters, and also his two brothers, Napoleon and Joseph Devlin.

SEVENTH VACANCY. OTTAWA, Aug. 30.—A seventh vacancy is created in the House of Commons by the death of E. B. Devlin, Liberal M.P. for Wright County, Quebec. Mr. Devlin first entered the House of Commons in 1905, when he was elected at a by-election to succeed Right Hon. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who resigned his seat for Wright, having also been elected for Quebec East. The subsequent general elections of 1908, 1911 and 1917 Mr. Devlin was re-elected. A keen debater and assiduous in his duties, Mr. Devlin played a prominent part in Opposition criticisms and parliamentary discussions. His wide circle of friends included men of all political parties.

Mr. Devlin was a native of Avimere, Quebec, and was a graduate of McGill University. He was married in 1907 to Cecile, daughter of the late Hon. L. R. Masson, formerly minister of militia in the Sir John A. Macdonald cabinet and lieutenant-governor of the province of Quebec.

PASTOR ENDED HIS SUFFERING WITH A BULLET

Rev. W. Haythornwaite Shot Himself While Delirious After Accident.

COCHRANE, Aug. 30.—The Anglican rector at Moose Factory, on James Bay, Rev. W. Haythornwaite, who was injured last night, ended his suffering with a bullet, according to word just received here from Rev. J. G. Anderson, bishop of the Anglican Diocese of Mooseonee, who is on a trip to Port Albany.

Writing to his wife, Bishop Anderson says the late rector suffered a compound fracture of his shoulder while helping to move a piano, and lay for weeks without medical attendance, the nearest doctor being at Cochrane, 180 miles distant. While crazed with the pain in his shoulder, and delirious, the rector two weeks ago escaped from his Indian attendants and shot himself.

Mr. Haythornwaite was principal of the Indian school at Moose Factory. He was well known here, where he was stationed as rector for twelve months, ten years ago. He took an active part in helping the lost American balloonists when they descended in the vicinity of Moose Factory last winter.

GERMANY DRAWING ON GOLD RESERVES FOR PAYMENT TODAY

Reichsbank Was Obligated To Take 68,000,000 Marks.

BERLIN, Aug. 30.—Announcement was made today by Otto von Glasesapp, vice-president of the Reichsbank, that Germany has paid a billion gold marks due to the allies on August 31. He added that the Reichsbank had been obliged to take 68,000,000 marks in gold dollars and other foreign monies from its gold reserves, which is now on its way to New York.

PAYMENTS DEPOSITED. NEW YORK, Aug. 30.—The German Government, through its fiscal agents in the United States, has anticipated further reparation obligations to the allies due tomorrow. According to well-informed bankers interested in presenting the Berlin Government these payments, which are variously estimated at \$65,000,000 to \$100,000,000, have already been deposited with the agents of the British, French and Belgian governments in this city.

Purchases of United States dollar exchange to effect this transaction were concluded several weeks ago, it was stated. This probably accounts for the recent stability of international remittances at this centre and the marked strength of Dutch and Scandinavian rates. These countries, it is understood, were the markets through which Germany acquired the greater portion of the United States exchange necessary to the completion of the payments maturing tomorrow.

BIG FOREST FIRE IS SPREADING RAPIDLY

Blaze Near Crow's Nest Pass Has Four-Mile Front.

CALGARY, Aug. 30.—The big forest fire which is raging on the British Columbia side of the main range of the Rockies, west of Crow's Nest Pass, has developed until it now covers a front of three to four miles. Efforts, which have been made to check its course in British Columbia, are apparently not meeting with much success, according to reports of air scouts to their headquarters at High River.

C. H. Moore, inspector of forest reserves for Alberta, today said that the fire-fighting forces of the threatened area have taken every precaution to guard against the fire spreading into the timber lying on his side of the line. The town of Crow's Nest is reported to be in danger.

The fire is burning an area north of the Canadian Pacific Railway track and the river, its eastern boundary facing the main range of the Rockies centered on Mount Thompson.

BANKS COME TO RESCUE OF CATTLEMEN

Advances Will Be Made To Those Who Have Security.

OTTAWA, Aug. 30.—Canadian Press.—Canadian cattle raisers will be carried over the period of abnormally low prices by advances from the banks secured by their stock. This announcement was made by Hon. S. F. Tolmie, minister of agriculture, today, prior to leaving to attend the fair at Sherbrooke, Que.

By arrangement between the Government and the Canadian Bankers' Association any cattle raiser who asks for a loan and has security in cattle will be given an advance to obtain fodder. The raisers who thus are enabled to carry their stock instead of getting rid of it at sacrifice prices.

Dr. Tolmie stated that the banks will loan all that the cattle are worth, and that every effort will be made to carry the raisers through. Special consideration will be given to the period of the loans in order to assist the cattlemen to weather the storm. It is understood that there is no specific limit placed on the total amount which the banks may advance under the arrangement with the Government.

SAYS CHEMICALS DECIDING FACTOR IN FUTURE WARS

More Merciful Than High Explosives, Declares Sir William Pope.

MONTREAL, Aug. 30.—Sir William Pope, president of the Society of Chemical Industry, in convention here, spoke today on "Gas Warfare." He said that at the time of the armistice materials had been found against which respirators were of no avail. This material would stop a man if it was present in the atmosphere in the proportion of about one part, by volume, in five millions. The air was made absolutely irrespirable when affected by this material.

Is More Merciful. Sir William urged that from a humanitarian viewpoint gas was a more merciful factor of warfare than high explosives, and its results had been shown to be far less destructive. As to mustard gas, a preparation which put a man out of the fighting strength for a period of six weeks, the allies, he said, had enough at the time of the armistice to have caused the Germans to be wading knee deep in it. He concluded that the chemical agencies would be the sole deciding factor of future wars.

Sees Good Results. At the opening sessions of the convention the incoming president, Prof. R. F. Burton, of McGill University, made his inaugural speech. He pointed out that Canada was not yet much advanced beyond the pioneer stage of industrial development, and said that the visit of the society to the Dominion and its choice of a Canadian president would have rich fruit if it led to the further introduction of scientific methods in Canadian manufacture and industry.

In the afternoon at a special convocation of McGill University the vice-chancellor bestowed on Sir William Pope the D. Sc. degree.

This concluded the sittings of the convention in Canada, the delegates leaving this evening for a visit to Shawinigan Falls and Grand Mere.

ANOTHER BODY IS TAKEN FROM WRECK

Remains of Rigger Found in Ruins of Big Dirigible.

HULL, England, Aug. 30.—The body of still another United States rigger who was killed in the ZR-2 disaster was found today. It was that of Maurice Lay of Greensboro, N. C.

At the inquest held today, Flying Officer Miller testified that the body of Brig.-Gen. Maitland, which was recovered yesterday, was found on the ship near the water ballast controls, which in emergencies are operated in an endeavor to insure the safety of the ship. On hearing this testimony, the coroner commented on the fact that Gen. Maitland's last act was directed to doing what was possible to save the vessel and her crew. The proceedings before the coroner today were purely formal.

MEMORIAL SERVICE TODAY. HOWDEN, Eng., Aug. 30.—British and United States airmen from the airbase near here and civilians from the surrounding countryside will gather at the church here at noon tomorrow to pay last tribute in a memorial service to the men who lost their lives in the ZR-2 disaster.

Thursday there will be another memorial service in Hull on a much bigger scale. Not only the military aviation forces, but the entire population of the city will participate in it.

CALL MEETING TO DISCUSS UNION

TORONTO, Aug. 30.—A meeting of the general conference special committee of the Methodist Church has been called for October 13 and 14, to take action on the favorable vote on church union given by the Presbyterian General Assembly in Toronto last June. A Toronto member says the special committee can do no more than recommend the calling of a special general conference to deal with the question of union, and this course he regarded as unlikely, in view of the fact that the regular Methodist conference will be held within a year. The special committee consists of 26 members, and they will meet in Toronto.

HEAVY INFANT MORTALITY. LONDON, Aug. 30.—A Reuter dispatch from Moscow reveals terrible infant mortality in the famine areas of Russia, which has reached a figure of 75 per cent of the population.

Declares Workers Who Slow Up Are Economic Charlatans

TORONTO, Aug. 30.—About 150 of the leading educationists of the province and city were the guests today of the directors of the National Exhibition at their daily luncheon, and the principal address was delivered by Dr. H. J. Cody, former minister of education for Ontario, who said that education would supply the answer to most of the clamorous demands of this unsettled period. Education, he said, would teach the need of greater production.

"The man," he said, "who takes the view that there will be more money to go around if he works more slowly or produces less is an economic charlatan."

Dr. Cody commended the adolescent attendance act, and declared that up to the age of 14 it was impossible to give a child all the culture and training that should make it intelligent and at the same time fit it for its life work.

U. F. O. President Declares Farmers Are Misrepresented

Meighen Administration Is Bitterly Attacked At Largely Attended Meeting Held in Osborne Tp.—Charges Repudiated That Farmers Are Profiteers.

[By Staff Reporter.] HENSALL, Aug. 30.—Addressing a largely attended gathering of Osborne Township electors at a U. F. O. garden party tonight, R. W. E. Burnaby, president of the U. F. O., and others of that party, bitterly attacked the Meighen administration at Ottawa. Hon. Manning Doherty, minister of agriculture, who was scheduled to speak, was unable to be present owing to the death of Lieut.-Governor Clarke. Other speakers were Mrs. McNaughton, school attendance officer of Biddulph Township, Middlesex; Andrew Hicks, M.P.P. for South Huron, Government whip; James Black, one of the township directors of the U. F. O.

Are Misrepresented. Mr. Burnaby said the farmers are misrepresented and misunderstood. "Quite recently," he said, "Premier Meighen said that farmers were 'wreckers.' That is wrong and he knows it. There is no more stable class of citizen than the farmer. We have been misrepresented as profiteers, and although we are getting used to names, there is a certain savor of the word 'profiteer' that we do not appreciate. We do know that a profiteer is someone who sets a price on his produce. Therefore, the farmer cannot be a profiteer. Some of the federal members have gone on the platform to explain how wealthy we are because we own automobiles, but who is more entitled to them than we are? What industry or profession would exist without the farmer?"

"We do not want misrepresentation. We are anxious that all classes realize our position and object. Surely there is no farmer who will say that there is not room for improvement in the business end of farming."

Urges All To Join. At this juncture the speaker urged that all farmers who had not affiliated themselves with the U. F. O. to get behind the movement.

YOUTHS WHIPPED FOR INDECENT ASSAULT

[Special To The Advertiser.] SARNIA, Aug. 30.—Harry Buchanan, D. Dionne and Ed. Dinell, three youths who recently received jail sentences and were ordered to be whipped by the magistrate, today receive the second part of their punishment at the hands of an officer from the prison farm at Guelph.

The offence of which they were found guilty was an indecent assault upon a young girl. The three were stripped, and were each given six strokes moderately applied, but, according to Sheriff A. J. Johnston, with good effect. Besides suffering from a fractured skull, he is also believed to have been injured internally. Slight hopes are entertained for his recovery, although tonight it was reported that he was holding his own.

The accident happened on the North-bound tracks of the C. P. R. just at the foot of Liverpool street. Accompanied by several other children, the boy had been playing with an express wagon. As the train approached, it was understood, he ran towards the locomotive in a vain effort to stop it. He stepped too close to the rails, however, and as the heavy engine passed he was struck by the pilot and tossed off to the side of the road. He was not hurt any distance, but when neighbors, who were passing, saw the boy in a helpless condition he was in an unconscious condition and was bleeding profusely about the head. He was immediately rushed to the hospital, where it was discovered that he had been very seriously hurt.

AUSTRIANS OCCUPYING MATTESDORF DISTRICT

Feared That Demonstration May Arouse Ire of Hungarians.

VIENNA, Aug. 30.—Eight thousand Austrian troops moved into the Mattesdorf district of Burgenland today and will police the region and clear out the foreign element there. Fears were expressed here today that this demonstration in force may provoke a response from the Hungarian insurgents under Lieut. Hejjas.

Refugees arriving here from Odenburg say that city is quiet, but wholly in the control of insurgents. Although the Austrians have established a provisional government at Mattesdorf for the territory they occupy the Burgenland affair apparently waits upon action by the Entente for settlement.

The social Democrats are demanding that the Austrian Government immediately declare its intention to hold a plebiscite in the entire territory of Burgenland.

SETTLING BY ARBITRATION. MONTREAL, Aug. 30.—Wage schedule differences between Montreal theatre managers and the Musicians' Protective Association will be settled by arbitration. It was announced today. The managers have proposed a 25 per cent wage cut, to go into effect September 1.

SLAYS BRIDE THEN SUICIDES

Awful Deed of Farmer Only Married Six Weeks.

[Special To The Advertiser.] MOUNT CLEMENT, Mich., Aug. 30.—William Fraillach, aged 25 years, a well-to-do Utica farmer, late tonight slashed the throat of his pretty bride of six weeks at their home and then threw himself before a passing train.

Fraillach was seen by the engineer to leap from a clump of bushes along the track, in front of the locomotive, but the pilot was unable to bring his engine to a stop until within 400 feet.

The farmer was decapitated and had both arms and legs severed.

Upon the report of the engineer to a village deputy, search was made for his wife. Officers found the woman in a pool of blood, with her throat cut from ear to ear.

Mrs. Fraillach was in her night clothes and the house appeared to be strewn with upturned furniture.

They were married July 14, after a courtship of only three weeks. It was known among the villagers that they quarrelled frequently and that Fraillach paid a Mount Clemens attorney a visit regarding a divorce.

It is understood that the farmer's wife sought to obtain a joint deed to Fraillach's property, which is valued at \$20,000, but that the latter refused.

Fraillach has recently been sick and it is believed by officials that he may have become demented during a quarrel with his wife.

Mrs. Fraillach was formerly Margaret Lapierre, 8743 Beaman street, Detroit. Her parents were advised of her death and arrived to take charge of the body tonight.

CELEBRATE HISTORIC NOVA SCOTIAN EVENTS

Canadians Arrive At Annapolis Royal From All Parts of Dominion.

ANNAPOLIS ROYAL, N. S., Aug. 30.—(By the Canadian Press.)—On the eve of the celebration here of the centenary of the granting of the charter of Nova Scotia to Sir William Alexander, the bicentenary of the establishment of the first court of the Dominion of Canada, and the centenary of the arrival in Annapolis of Thomas Chandler Haliburton, man of letters and law, the first representative of the Dominion of Canada, began to arrive in this pretty little town.

Hastening by train and motor from Nova Scotia and even outside Nova Scotia territory, Canadians who take an interest and pride in the story of the Dominion's birth and progress converged on Annapolis Royal to witness the ceremonies in recognition of the debt they owe to settler pioneers. Many men eminent in Canadian life arrived here tonight or will arrive tomorrow to stand on the parade grounds of old Fort St. Anne and watch the uncovering of three bronze tablets commemorating ancient events of import in lessening degrees to Nova Scotia, to Canada and to the British Empire and to the world.

Premier G. H. Murray will officially unveil the tablet presented by the province to mark the passage of three hundred years since King James VI. granted a charter to Nova Scotia.

Chief Justice Harris and Sir James Aikens, acting lieutenant-governor of Manitoba and president of the Canadian Bar Association, will, on behalf of the bar, unveil the bronze tablet perpetuating the fact that it was in Fort St. Anne that English common law first came to Canada in 1721.

Frank C. Whitman, vice-president of the Annapolis Historical Society, will unveil the tablet presented by that organization in memory of Judge Haliburton's residence here.

CRIMINAL ACTION HAS BEEN HALTED

MONTREAL, Aug. 30.—A sudden halt was called today in the criminal proceedings taken by Arthur Berthiaume, president and general manager of La Presse Publishing Company, against his two brothers, Edouard and Eugene, in connection with matters relating to the administration of the company, when counsel for the two accused objected to hearing of the voluntary statement on the charges preferred against his clients on the ground that further proceedings were suspended by law in virtue of a writ of certiorari served on Judge Cusson last week. Judge Cusson committed Eugene and Edouard two weeks ago to stand trial on charges, alleging conspiracy to steal \$120,000, and of actually stealing that sum. The two brothers were remanded until today for voluntary statement, but were not present when case was called.

Judge Cusson agreed the proceedings should be suspended, pending the decision of the higher court on the writ of certiorari.

MARTIAL LAW PROCLAIMED. CALCUTTA, India, Aug. 30.—Martial law has been proclaimed in the five sub-districts of the Malabar district.

CURRY LIKELY TO JOIN THE FARMERS

Ready To Run As Govt. Sup- porter On Record To Date.

TORONTO, Aug. 30.—A Toronto Globe news item says: The only thing that will keep J. W. Curry, K.C., Liberal member for South-east Toronto, from crossing the floor of the Legislature next session to sit with the farmers is that there is no vacant bench on the Government side. Discussing his intentions, today, Mr. Curry stated it as his opinion that Liberal principles were being more actively enunciated to the right than to the left of the speaker.

"To all intents and purposes, however, Mr. Curry has been a supporter of the Drury Government for two sessions, so his declaration of sympathy does not indicate any alteration in respective strengths."

Asked if he would run as a Drury Government supporter at the next election Mr. Curry said that he would do so on the Government's side up to date. However, before the election the Government might do something with which he might not agree in which case he would not come out as a Drury candidate, and then, again, he counted, he might not run at all.

"Are you in accord with the Government's hydro-radial policy?" he was asked.

"Absolutely," was the reply.

GIVE UP HOPE FOR CANADIAN IMPORTER

General Opinion Is That Government Ship Has Foundered.

VANCOUVER, B.C., Aug. 30.—Practically all hope for the Government steamer Canadian Importer has been given up. Capt. Wingate of the Canadian Winner, who has been searching since Saturday morning, sent this message today:

"General opinion importer founded. A second discouraging aspect of the tragic affair is that rough weather has swept that part of the Pacific during the last three days. If Capt. Bissett and the 32 members of his crew remaining on the vessel actually succeeded in getting clear in the ship's lifeboats, the heavy seas over the week-end would have given them a strenuous time."
