ONLY 3 NAMES FOR I. L. P. NOMINATION

Commissioner Sanderson and
Ald. Stokes Retire.

ST. THOMAS, Oct. 14.—With the re-
tirement of Commissioner W. E. San-
derson and Ald. W. Stokes from the list
of candidates nominated to head the I.
L. P. O. party at the federal elec-
tions, the names to be voted upon by
the laborers today and tomorrow have
been reduced to three, John Lane, A. E.
Hookway and Albert Roberts.

The voting is now being proceeded
with at the I. L. P. Hall and will be
continued until Saturday evening. The
announcement will follow the results of
the count at the nomination convention,
Saturday night, at the city building. The
remaining candidates have subscribed
to the tenets and principles of the I. L.
P. and they have the assurance of
Commissioner Sanderson and Ald. Stokes
that whoever may be chosen as the
nominee of the united party, he will
have their support and individual efforts
to secure his election.

Another Summer Resort.

Hydro-Electric Extension.
Following the rural installation of
electric power in a few weeks, the ser-
vice will be extended to the County
House of Industry. A special meeting
of that committee was held this morn-
ing with Warden Hugh C. McKillop and
the members in attendance. The com-
mittee applied for the extension of hy-
dro-electric power a year ago and the
distribution scheme agreed to then by
the committee and farmers, on the line,
has become a practical possibility. Other
business of importance was discussed.

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RAIL WALKOUT MAY BE SEQUEL TO U. S. AWARD

Secret Conference At Chicago
Fails When Roads Ask
Further Cut.

UNION LEADERS SILENT

**Officials Declare Freight Rate
Reduction Would Mean
Bankruptcy.**

CHICAGO, Oct. 14.—Representa-
tives of United States railroads today,
after announcing that they cannot re-
duce freight rates at present without
going into bankruptcy, and that they
would immediately seek a further re-
duction in employees' wages from the
United States Railroad Labor Board,
went into secret conference with union
leaders in an effort to reach an amic-
able settlement of wage difficulties,
which at times have threatened to tie
up the transportation system of the
country.

At the conference union leaders asked
reconsideration of their request of
last July that a 12 1/2 per cent wage
reduction be granted by the labor board
be not put into effect immediately;
that no further wage reductions be
sought at present, and that no change
be made in the overtime pay rate.
The statement was refused, and the
rail heads presented their statement
announcing the proposal to seek new
reductions and not to reduce rates
until further reductions were granted.
The labor leaders left the conference
immediately, and few of them would
discuss its proceedings or predict the
results.

The executives announced, however,
that the proposal to pass future wage
reductions on to the public by applying
to the interstate commerce commission
for a reduction in freight and passenger
rates had been accepted, and that all
future wage reductions would be met
by a corresponding rate reduction.
The conference was begun at the sug-
gestion of the union leaders, their in-
vitation for a meeting being accepted
by the rail heads, following the an-
nouncement concerning freight rates.
As the meeting started, the committee
appointed by the Association of
Railway Executives declared that they
believed it would settle most of the im-
mediate difficulties between the carriers
and their employees.

The union leaders were backward
about discussing the meeting, although
they indicated that its purpose might
be almost nullified by the announcement
that a further wage reduction would be
sought.

W. G. Lee, president of the Brother-
hood of Railroad Trainmen, said that
"since the union men already had
authorized their leaders to call a strike
rather than accept the recent 12 1/2 per
cent wage cut, they would not have the
nerve to suggest another cut."

The executive, it was announced,
wished the wages of train service men
returned to the existing basis as granted
by the increase granted by the labor
board decision of July, 1920. This will
necessitate a 10 per cent reduction, it
was said.

The union leaders left the conference
with the railroad executives after be-
ing closeted with them for two hours,
but refused to discuss the proceedings.
It was understood that the rail heads
might issue a statement later.

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Border Police Busy Checking Flood of Counterfeit Money

Detroit Officials Unearth Bootlegging Ring Who Specialize
in Paying For Goods With Bogus Bills.

DETROIT, Mich., Oct. 14.—A counter-
feit money crisis the like of which the
treasury department has never faced,
has been keeping Detroit operatives of
the United States secret service busy
with more than a score of successfully
prosecuted cases since the first of the
year.

Counterfeiters and bootleggers are
working hand in hand in spreading an
endless flow of counterfeit banknotes,
reaching into the millions in valuation.
Ninety per cent of the arrests made
for counterfeiting by secret service
agents of Detroit blaze a trail to the
headquarters of a bootlegging ring, de-
clared Joseph A. Palma, chief of the
Detroit police office, tonight.

Co-operating with Canadian border
police, Detroit agents recently un-
earthed an international bootlegging
ring that specialized in the negotiation
of counterfeit currency in payment of
purchases. Testimony during the trial
of one of the leaders of the gang was
to the effect that \$18,000 has been

passed in spurious ten dollar bills in
one transaction alone.

Due to the fact that most of the
transactions for contraband liquor are
made under cover of darkness, the fear
of discovery of bogus tender is much
lessened. It is the aftermath of these
double crossings that often leads one
of the parties involved to "sneak" on
the other.

Most of the counterfeit currency in-
tercepted by Detroit operatives are
raised bills, although two recent raids
disclosed complete photographic plants
and dies for the manufacture of new
money.

In raising notes, the counterfeiter
usually chooses a bill of a single unit in
denomination and merely adds a cipher
or two, thus making a \$10 out of a \$1,
or a \$50 certificate from \$5 bill. This
is considered a very clumsy method,
easy of detection.

Another method is that of splitting a
real bill into two parts, pasting halves
on special paper, thus making two ap-
parently genuine certificates.

The clash with the police yester-
day in Shattisbury avenue, a num-
ber of pieces of iron bars with sharp-
ened ends, made into a form of pocket
weapon, many bits of lead and other
missiles were found on the pavement
and inside of shops where windows
were smashed.

The police quietly kept an "ear in"
at all of the meetings held by the un-
employed. Throughout the metropol-
itan area the listeners frequently drew
ed carelessly in the guise of unem-
ployed.

**"REVOLUTION" FOUND
POLICE PREPARED**

LONDON, Eng., Oct. 14.—Information
obtained by police emissaries several
weeks ago that noon yesterday had been
fixed for the beginning of a "revolution"
under the Communist banner accounted
for the unprecedented preparations for
dealing with any emergency by Scotland
Yard, it was learned today.

After what the Daily Herald, the La-
bor organ, terms "the battle of Pica-
dilly" yesterday, when hundreds of
mounted and foot police charged into
the crowds of unemployed, demonstra-
tors and bruised a few heads, all was
quiet today. There were only a few
leaders in Trafalgar Square, which yester-
day was rimmed by hundreds of po-
lice. Scotland Yard authorities ex-
pressed the belief that there is little
danger of an early recurrence of yester-
day's scenes.

Inquiry today elicited the fact that
yesterday's police preparations included
the commandeering of the Metropol-
itan Underground Railway and the om-
nibus lines, if found necessary, which
would have enabled the concentration
of 15,000 police at any trouble center
within half an hour.

Last Wednesday, on the eve of the
monster demonstration, the unemploy-
ed of one of the London suburbs were
addressed by a leader who told them:
"You must not break your lines to get
drinks, take a bottle with you."

When asked by one of his hearers
what should be done with the bottles,
the leader winked and said: "I don't
care how you get rid of the bottles, but
have a long walk and will be on your
feet a long time; so take with you a
good stout stick—it may be useful."

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GALT'S POPULATION HAS GROWN DURING YEAR

GALT, Oct. 14.—While other munici-
palities have been going back in popu-
lation Galt has been continuing its
forward march. The census returns
issued on Aug. 17 gave Galt's popu-
lation of 13,210, an increase over the
previous year's population of 108, but to-
day Assessor Jesse Welland announced
that his rolls were complete and that
the city's population was 13,332, an in-
crease over last year of 240, and of 132
since the census figures were an-
nounced.

The city's total assessment is now
\$12,874,385, an increase of \$526,985. The
taxable real property amounts to \$8-
\$10,150, while the total taxable assess-
ment is \$10,822,020. Every ward in the
city showed an increase in population,
and ward five is experiencing the most
building.
