BRITISH TROOPS READY TO BATTLE TURKS ARMY

Forces at Dardanelles Awaiti ng Reinforcements of French and Italian Battalion, and Contingent From New Zealand.

LONDON. Sept. 17.—The Constantinople correspondent of the Times says that Mustapha Kemal Pasha informed Sir Harry Lamb at the Smyrna conference that he considered the Angora government in a state of war with Great Britain. But he afterwards modified this statement in his offical capacity defining the relations as "not hostile, but 'suspended."

LONDON, Sept. 17 .- With British troops entrenching at strategic points on the Dardanelles, French and Italian battalions rushing to join them, and from far New Zealand word that an Anzac contingent will be dispatched to the scenes of their heroic sacrifices in the late war to assist in dealing with the Turkish Nationalists, there has been a swift carrying into effect of the allied pronouncements regarding a firm determination to preserve the freedom of the Dardanelles and the Bosphorus.

The British troops are supported by heavy artillery, and backed by the fleet and officials here are confident that the combined allied land and sea forces, which are declared to be already prepared for an eventuality, can hold Constantinople against all odds.

The Turks have bombarded the last departing Greek transports. from the Chesme peninsula, despite the British appeal for mercy, on the ground that the Greeks were helpless and no longer combatants. 


