

All State Officials Withdraw From Brazil Capitol

REBELS CONTROL SAO PAULO CITY

Latest Reports Indicate That the Situation Is Still Serious.

WILL PROTECT LIFE

Associated Press Despatch. Washington, July 11.—The governor of Sao Paulo and other state officials have withdrawn from the capitol which is entirely in the control of the revolutionists, a despatch to the state department today from Consul Heberle in Sao Paulo declared. The despatch was described as the first official information from the center of the revolt to reach this government. It gave no further details except that protection of life and property had been promised.

SITUATION SERIOUS.

Associated Press Despatch. Buenos Aires, July 11.—News arriving here from Brazil from both official and unofficial sources indicates that the situation in Sao Paulo, scene of the insurrectionary outbreak, is still very serious and that there is a great deal of unrest in other parts of Brazil.

In Canada's Parliament

Canadian Press Despatch. Ottawa, July 11.—Today in Parliament—The Senate will sit. The Commons will consider minor government bills and the estimates of the immigration department.

Yesterday in Parliament—In the Senate the church union bill was given second reading. All clauses with the exception of two passed the committee stage.

In the House of Commons it was decided to begin morning sittings on Monday.

The newly created audit board and the pulpwood commission were criticized by the opposition, but the estimates providing for them were passed.

Expenses of the royal grain inquiry commission was criticized, but votes totalling \$125,000 for that commission were passed. The Prince Rupert and Edmonton public elections, the Japanese relief fund and trade investigation in the West Indies were also discussed and estimates voted.

TWELVE BOOTLEGGERS PAY INCOME TAXES

All List Pay in Excess of \$3,000, Commissioner Bennett Declares.

Twelve "resident" bootleggers of London pay income tax to the city according to Assessment Commissioner Bennett. The commissioner naturally refuses to say where these obliging gentlemen can be found or what their names are, but he vouches for them as bootleggers, that they admit it and pay income tax on the money they make in this way. All twelve pay on more than \$3,000.

No business tax is paid by these chaps, so far. Once the commissioner felt inclined to do so, but found it to be impracticable. "If there were a limited liability company in the city formed by bootleggers we would certainly place a business tax on it," he said.

"In such an instance we would be able to assess the dividends as well, and the city would gain some money. But when each bootlegger is operating individually he could claim exemption on the income assessment for the amount of his business assessment and we could not do anything. However, we are receiving a fair amount of taxes from the bootleggers of the city and so long as that continues we can have no reason to go after them for a business tax."

LONDON'S DEBENTURE DEBT NOW STANDS AT \$6,000,000

With the new debenture issue of a million dollars sold, the city still has a borrowing margin of \$2,000,000, according to City Treasurer Bell. The position of London as a sound commercial center and the worth of her bond issues is well recognized by bonding houses in this country and in the United States. At the present time the net debenture debt of the city is \$6,000,000.

VICTIM'S CONDITION IS VERY SERIOUS

Andrew Johnson Buried Under Gravel Slide at Manor Park.

The condition of Andrew Johnston, 11 McKay street, Manor Park, who was caught in a gravel slide yesterday afternoon while working in a gravel pit, was reported by Victoria Hospital authorities this afternoon to be very serious. He received injuries about the head and body and an operation will be performed later today to determine whether he has suffered a broken back.

Mr. Johnston was working close to the wall of the pit, which rises to the height of sixty feet, when without warning a layer of quicksand at the level gave way and precipitated tons of dirt and gravel on the unfortunate man.

The only warning that the workmen had of the accident was a loud crash, as the dirt fell.

Was Drawing Loads.

Mr. Johnston was drawing loads from the pit and had just brought his wagon back to be refilled. When the crash came his fellow workmen thought that it was just another cave-in which is frequent in gravel pits, and continued with their work until they noticed that Mr. Johnston was missing and began a hurried search for him. Finally they went to work on the pile of dirt that had just fallen and after five minutes careful digging located him in an unconscious condition and scarcely breathing.

Dr. Bowman was immediately called and he had the injured man rushed to Victoria Hospital where Dr. Pritchard took over the case. After careful examination it was found the victim was suffering from severe injuries, and the physician fears that his back is broken. He cannot, however, make a definite decision for some hours.

In Many Accidents.

Although only 35 years old, Mr. Johnston has been in many accidents. Charles Quick, the owner of the pit and the man's employer, was present at the time the accident occurred, about 4 o'clock, and declared that in all his experience as a teamster, he had never seen a worse mishap in a pit before. The man was completely buried, not one part of his body being visible.

JAMES REID FOUND IN DYING CONDITION

Rushed to Victoria Hospital, Suffering Alcoholic Poison —Will Recover.

James Reid, who recently spent several weeks in Victoria Hospital recovering from alcoholic poisoning, was rushed back to the same institution late last night, having been discovered in a similar condition in a ditch near Westminster Hospital where it is said he was dumped by a taxi driver.

Hospital authorities lost no time in using a stomach pump on Reid, and he probably owes his life to their prompt efforts. His pulse was barely beating when he arrived at the hospital.

Westminster authorities called High Constable Wharton, who ordered the man to Victoria Hospital as fast as a motor would carry him.

This afternoon Reid is greatly improved and will be discharged from the hospital. The high constable will be awaiting him, and he will be arrested on a charge of being intoxicated in a public place.

Reid was just recently released from jail, the high constable stated, having been arrested at Lang-street west, during a brawling party. He is a former patient at Westminster, but refused to take treatment there, according to Dr. McGhie.

Trustees of the board here who have received "letters of introduction" while visiting distant cities report having received excellent treatment from school officials, and have brought back interesting and useful data.

AVERAGE PER CAPITA INCOME HERE IS \$85

London Ranks Third Among Ontario Cities, With Ottawa at Top.

London has an average per capita income assessment of \$85 and ranks third among the cities of Ontario, according to the assessment commissioner. Toronto has an average assessment of \$137, and Ottawa has a mark of \$112. The lowest figure on the list is Woodstock with \$18.

The reason that Ottawa is so high is the large number of government employees there and the same thing applies to Toronto. Other figures in Ontario are: Hamilton, \$76 per head; Brantford, with an average of \$47, is next; Sarnia follows, with an average of \$46; Windsor is next, with an average of \$39; St. Thomas, with an average of \$30, follows; Guelph average is \$25; Chatham is next with \$21, while Woodstock ends the list with an average income assessment of \$18 per head.

EXPENSE TOO BIG, SAYS DOUGLASS

Lauds Idea, However, of the Annual Medical Inspection of Children.

DUTY OF PARENTS

Ald. Douglass, chairman of the finance committee, while in favor of an annual physical examination of all school children, as suggested by the city medical officer, Dr. W. S. Downham, considers that the expense involved is out of proportion to the good that would be achieved.

"The number of children," he states, "who are in actual need of this service, is but a very small proportion of all children. Then, too, if a medical officer for the school board were appointed, there would always be the difficulty met with wherever it is put into practice that his statements about a child are tested out by the family physician before the parents will accept it."

This means that the work is being duplicated. What is really needed is an education for all parents that their boys and girls need to be very carefully watched all through their growing period, and that they should have if not a yearly examination, then at least an examination every three or four years. Victoria Hospital, which is the city hospital, has capable surgeons and physicians, who are paid to make diagnoses and give treatment in the free clinics, and parents might well make more use of this civic service.

The work could not be any more efficiently done by a man appointed to the school board. A healthy child is the greatest asset that any city or country can have, and no one knows that better than a medical man. At the same time, I believe that the expense of a medical officer to give his whole time to the children in the schools is prohibitory.

GLENCOE RESIDENT PLEADS GUILTY IN WEAPONS CASE

James A. Beattie of Glencoe has informed Magistrate Peter Morrison of that village that he has decided to plead guilty to a charge of having concealed weapons in his possession. He will come before the magistrate tonight to pay his fine.

Licence Inspector Bolton searched Beattie's car at Glencoe yesterday and found an empty whiskey bottle and glass, as well as a blackjack. Beattie was put under arrest by High Constable Wharton, who was also in Glencoe, and was bailed to appear next week.
