Actual Fighting Between Rival Chinese Factions Started This Morning.

Shanghai, Sept. 3 .- Actual fighting ported in progress today in this district, with Shanghai and the extreme eastern portion of Kiang Su province

Although reports received here yes terday from points along the line of the Peking-Nanking Railway in-dicated the opposing armies of Lu Yung-Hsiang and Chi Shieh-Yuan had clashed, official confirmation of the beginning of hostilities came to day from General Ho Fang-Lin, de

fence commissioner of Shanghai. Lu Yung-Hsiang ruler of the con-tested section of Kiang-Su Province. is defending his territory against the aggressive forces of Chi Shieh-Yua, ruler of the uncontested section of the province.

More than twenty foreign war craft

were assembled in the habor at Shanghai awaiting any action on the part of the rival military governors. which would place Shanghai in the line of fire and the lives of foreigners in jeopardy. On land the Shanghai volunteer corps and the Shanghai defence unit, which included British and U. S. military units, were pre-pared to take up defensive fighting position on the boundaries of the foreign quarter.

Although a large number of troops are engaged in the conflict, reports received here from Chekiang say that no material advantage has been gained by either side. It is said that the engagement to-
