DECLARES UNION AGAINST DOCTRINE

Rev. David Perrie, D.D., of Wingham, Preaches in St. Andrew's Church.

"What we need is not less Presbyterianism but more Presbyterianism," declared Rev. David Perrie, D.D., of Knox church, Wingham, speaking against the church union movement in St. Andrew's Presbyterian church yesterday morning.

"What need is there for a Saviour, to offer salvation to all peoples," asked Dr. Perrie, "unless there is a God who is supreme and who will punish the guilty? Presbyterianism has emphasized the fact of a severe God throughout all the ages."

The speaker condemned the proposed union as "a religious-political combination against which it is feared few powers could stand," and averred that "to rule and command through power of numbers rather than through spiritual power, was to rule after the fashion of the state."

"The Lord prayed for spiritual unity, not organic unity," asserted Dr. Perrie, in declining to acquiesce in the statement that the union was a fulfillment of the Lord's prayer for the union of Christendom and of His people.

The speaker charged that in supporting church union, ministers had "completely overturned" the vow they had taken at ordination to adhere to the Westminster confession of faith and to support the government of the church by session presbyteries and general assemblies.

He further charged that church union is "purely a ministers' movement." "That we must have church union," he said, "seems to be a preacher's hobby. But the ministers are not the church."

"Hold by your old, historic church, think of the past and stand by your church so that the people of the generations to come will be able to know the principles of that church," Dr. Perrie said in asserting that there would still be a strong and vigorous Presbyterian church from Vancouver to Halifax, even after union has been consummated.

Since Rev. D. C. MacGregor, D.D., pastor of St. Andrew's, had spoken in favor of church union in the Wingham Presbyterian church last spring, Dr. Perrie's visit yesterday was in the nature of an exchange.

In strongly urging the members of the congregation to read for themselves the basis of union, Dr. MacGregor stated that he would speak on the question for the last time prior to the vote on Sunday morning, Dec. 14.

The church rendered in masterful fashion "The Festival of the Nativity" (Dudley Buck), the solo parts being taken by Mrs. Robert Durst, Miss Ulah B. Kennedy, E. A. Webster and L. Christl. Two fine organ numbers by C. E. Wheeler, C. C. O. organist and choir director, were "Barcarole" (W. G. Bensen) and "Marche Triomphe" (J. L. Stone).

The large congregation present listened to Dr. Perrie's deliverance with the closest of attention and interest.

DECREASE IS SHOWN IN CUSTOMS REVENUE

Forty-One Million Dollar Drop in Eight Months Noted.

Canadian Press Despatch. Ottawa, Nov. 29.—A decrease of \$41,028,520 in the total customs and excise revenue for the eight months of the fiscal year ending today, as compared with the same period a year ago, is shown by the monthly statement issued from the customs and excise department.

Total customs and excise revenue for the eight months of the present fiscal year was \$164,254,325. For the same period of 1923-24 the total revenue was \$205,282,845. Customs import duties fell off \$11,725,491 during the eight months. In the eight months period of the present fiscal year custom import duties were collected amounting to \$80,865,535, as compared with \$91,700,170 in the previous year. Excise tax collections amounting to \$57,783,684 during the eight months period of 1924-25 were less by \$28,453,712 than for corresponding period of the preceding year.

There was a falling off of \$11,725,491 in excise duties collected, which during the eight months of the present year totaled \$24,841,578. The decrease in the customs and excise revenue for the month of November alone as compared with November, 1923, was approximately \$4,300,000. Customs and excise revenue collected during the present month amounted to \$20,952,108.

BLACKMAIL SOLICITOR HIMSELF FACES CHARGE

W. C. Hobbs Alleged to Have Received Stolen Check For \$750,000.

Associated Press Despatch. London, Nov. 30.—William Cooper Hobbs, a famous solicitor, whose testimony in the Robinson suit, involving the alleged blackmailing of an unnamed Indian prince, was one of the big sensations of the trial, appeared in a new street police court this morning charged under the larceny act with receiving stolen property abroad. The magistrate ordered him remanded.

The charge detailed by the public prosecutor was that the defendant Hobbs had received on December 27, 1923, a check for \$750,000, which had been stolen abroad.

Pictures By Wireless Are Transmitted Across Ocean

Portraits and News Pictures Sent From London To New York.

USE NEW SYSTEM

Invention Proves Highly Successful—Ready For Immediate Use.

Associated Press Despatch. New York, Nov. 30.—A portrait of the president of the United States was put on the air in London today and twenty minutes later was reproduced in New York.

As the finished picture was removed from an oscillating cylinder in the offices of the Radio Corporation of America, the jiggling stylus which had drawn it remained poised for a moment. Then their was a buzz, the stylus perked its head this way and that, and putting its inky nose to the paper, traced out a panel in which it embroidered these words from an old Chinese proverb: "One picture is worth 10,000 words."

Again the stylus rested for a moment, and again it resumed dancing upon that cylinder until, as the stylus passed, it perfected the likeness of Premier Stanley Baldwin, Secretary of State Hughes, the Prince of Wales, Queen Alexandra, Mr. Young, showed H.M.S. River and the finish of the Oxford-Cambridge relay races, and topped off the performance with an artistic flourish by reproducing a mural from the Royal Academy.

Radio Corporation officials announced at the end of the demonstration that the all-American invention for radio transmission of photographs, paintings and printed messages was a complete success. With but little refinement, said the inventors, the process could be made available immediately for the almost instantaneous transatlantic transmission of news pictures, of secret business messages, of diplomatic correspondence and of identification photographs in police hunts for international criminals.

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JOHNSTON CHOSEN FOR BOYS' COUNCIL

Templin Will Also Go To Toronto To Attend Boys' Parliament.

Allan Johnston, of the St. Andrew's Olympians, and Hies Templin of the Knox Orwegos, will represent London in the fourth older boys' parliament. The third member from London will be Hartley Upshall, who represents the city by virtue of being boy mayor.

The elections closed Saturday night and the boys' council here, representing the Olympians of St. Andrew's. His year's record as a progressive mayor sent him back the following years.

Templin is mentor of the Onwegos and has done much to further the interests of C. S. E. T. work in London. This year he holds the post of city clerk in the boys' council, and was grand orator of the older boys' conference which was held here during the early part of November.

London will also be represented in the parliament by Hartley Upshall and Frank Adams. Adams is a candidate for premier. Parliament will be held in Toronto during Christmas week, when C. S. E. T. members from all parts of the province will gather at the parliament buildings to enact legislation for the further progress of the C. S. E. T. work in Ontario.
