BAPTISTS AT RIDGETOWN OBSERVE HARVEST HOME

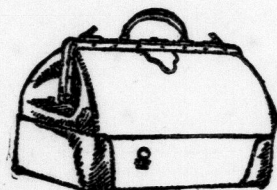
