MISSING GIRL DROWNED AT BEACON HILL LAKE

Body of Maud Newberry Taken From Goodacre Lake--Verdict of "Found Drowned."

(From Tuesday's Daily.) The body of the missing Evelyn Maud Newberry, the 18-year-old girl who disappeared on February 3rd last, was found on Sunday in Goodacre Lake, at Beacon Hill, standing in an upright position fast in the mud in seven feet of water about 12 feet from the stone bridge. An inquest was held by the coroner yesterday afternoon, at which a verdict of "found drowned" was

The unfortunate girl, employed by Mr. and Mrs. Baines, of 194 Yates street, was in the habit of taking her employer's children to Beacon Hill and evidently had, on the night of her disappearance gone to the bridge she had so often visited and jumped from it.

There is usually about ten feet of water, but it is now low, measuring water, but it is now low, measuring about seven feet and on Sunday, some young men walking over the bridge noticed the head below the surface. They secured a long pole and investigated and then notified the police. Sergt. Redgrave and Constable Fry went at once and recovered the body. Its position indicated that the unfortunate girl had jumped feet first and had become fast in the mud, the body standing erect. When the remains were removed they were identified by relatives.

Dr. Carter, who made the post mortem examination, was the first witness called at the inquest. He said there were no marks of violence, and all organs were normal, the heart and lungs indicating death by drowning. The next witness, one of the boys who found the body, said he and those with him were looking at the swans when they saw the body in the water, about 12 feet from the bridge. The police were telephoned for and removed the body.

W. W. Baines said the girl had left his house at 8:10, February 3rd and had not been seen again. There was nothing unusual noticed about her; she was in good spirits. Nothing strange had been noted, beyond spells of forgetfulness and at times, laughter that seemed hysterical. She was well behaved.
