The young man who has exhausted his red paint and is now staggering homewards regards it with a maudlin smile and gives a husky whoop of greeting as it flashes by him. Sober pedestrians scurry into convenient doorways or turn up their storm collars. The whirling snow mounts upward like some white palpable mist, silvering the hair and making a fine dust on his overcoat.
