BLASTING AT THE FALLS.

The Canada Side Suffers From Operation Across the River. Acress the River.

Albany, Oct. 10.—The danger to life and property in Niagara Falls, Ont., has about ended, according to Deputy Attorney-General Kisselburgh, who returned here to-day. As a result of his investigations he reports that the work of preparing the road bed for the railway along the Niagara River on the American side is about completed, and that but little blasting remains to be accomplished. The foreman who had charge of the blasting in August, which sent large pieces of rock across the river gorge into Niagara Falls in Canada, was discharged at the time and so was the foreman who had charge of the blast on Saturday last, which hurled a rock through the Niagara Falls, Ont., custom house from the roof to the cellar. Mr. Kisselburgh says that there will be no more trouble and that the railroad company have settled all damages occasioned on the Canadian side as a result of their blasting operations.




