

MILLIONS TO KEEP WORKERS IDLE

Employees of printing establishments in Canada and the United States to the number of 9,000 went on strike a year ago for shorter hours and a "living wage." Yet other printers who were not called out have been able to pay to the strike fund ten per cent. out of the wages they have been getting, the same wages which were regarded as below the "living" standard by the union officials. Nearly \$9,000,000 has been spent in strike pay which does not take into account loss of wages to employees, loss to employers and loss to business generally dependent upon the printing industry. No one has benefitted and the union officials are now said to be allowing the strike to peter out. The latter made the mistake of ignoring the economic problem and the fact that conditions were such that the public would not pay increased prices for printed products.

REALIGNMENT OF THE PARTIES

The Winnipeg Tribune, dealing with suggestions as to a realignment of parties, recalls that twenty-five years ago there was published in its columns an offer of a generous sum to be donated to the General Hospital if there was one man who would stand up and define any real difference between the Liberal party and the Liberal-Conservative party. There were no takers; no volunteers. Today the article goes on, certain newspapers in connection with influential elements in both old-line parties, are discussing the question of a re-arrangement of Liberals and Conservatives, putting into one fold all avowed protectionists, no matter by what names they have hitherto been known and in the other all those who from principle or otherwise, are avowed radical tariff reformers, with free trade as their ultimate goal. The failure of Liberal leaders to redeem when in power their promises made in opposition to remove the tariff burdens under which the people were said to groan are referred to, and the article concludes:

"Today, the suggestion that there should be a re-grouping of the sheep and the goats is not without merit. It might result in more sincerity in tariff discussion, and tariff enactment would henceforth be in the hands of avowed tariff-reformers, or the ultimate free-traders."

"Dishonesty in platform or parliamentary discussion is morally and therefore nationally weakening. If it were possible by a party re-arrangement, to have men speak and act as they really think the country would be the better for it."

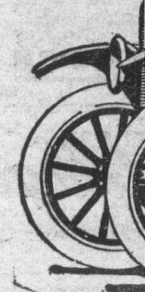
