

(WHO'S WHO, 1906.)—

GIROUARD, HON. DÉSIRÉ; a Justice of the Supreme Court of Canada since 1895; born, St. Timothée, P. Q., 7 July 1836; descendant of Antoine Girouard, of Montluçon (Allier) France; private secretary to Governor de Ramesay, Montreal, 1720; m. 1st 1862, Mathilde Pratt; 2nd, 1865, Essie Cranwill; 3rd, 1881, Edith Beatty. Educated: Montreal College, 1850-57. D.C.L. of McGill and LL.D. of Ottawa University. Practised at Montreal Bar. 1860-95; Q. C. 1876; M.P. (C.) Jacques Cartier, 1878-95; Chairman of Privileges and Elections for fourteen years; carried Deceased Wife's Sister Bill, 1882; was offered a seat in the Canadian Cabinet, 1891 and 1895. Publications: *Essai sur les Lettres de Change*, 1860 (the only Canadian text book quoted in Quebec Civil Code); The Bill of Exchange Act, 1890, jointly with his son Désiré H.; in 1889 and following years published a series of historical essays, which in 1893 were embodied in a volume "Lake St. Louis" etc., translated from the French by his son Désiré H., for which he received the Confederation Medal in 1895; in 1900 a supplement was produced, and in 1903 an enlarged edition of the same in English was published.
