As it is but gradually that any new system becomes known, it will hardly be superfluous to make some general observations, descriptive of the aducational system above-named. Kindergarten represents a mode of conveying instruction to children which is traccable to the ducommon gift styled common sense; it manifestly suvolved much thought on the part of Friedrich Froebel, its originator, and one of its incidental recommendations is that the system it involves can hardly be adopted by a teacher as a mercy profession; it necessitates applied for teaching on the part of all who espouse it, and consequently affords a gunrantee that the instructor is not merely a repository of knowledge, but possesses the power of impart-ing it; the lack of the power of communicating knowledge has over been one of the great banes of our educational systems, and at the root of that may be said to lie the consideration that the door stands open to teachers (as it does to members of other professions) in utter disregard of personal qualification. "Frochel starts from the fundamental idea that all education should begin with a development of the desire for activity innote in the child"; in other words, he utilises natural tendencies. "Each step in the course of training is a logical sequence of the preceding one; and the various means of occupation are developed, one from saother, in a perfectly natural order, beginning with the simplest, and concluding with the most difficult So far as it may be possible to convey an idea of the proceedings at Mrs. Arthur Graham's school from a brief visit, and within the compass of a column in this portion of The Critic, we will endeavor so to do. a school is more like the orderly frolte of a nurery
than what we have been accustomed to associate
with the idea of tuition; it delights the children as
well it may, and it cannot full to lead to much the
same kind of interchange of thought which takes
place between an intelligent mother and her child.


