

Hon. Mr. REID:

1. Mr. A. E. Warren and Mr. F. P. Brady. Mr. Warren's jurisdiction extends from O'Brien west on the Transcontinental and all lines Canadian Northern Railway west of Port Arthur. Mr. Brady's jurisdiction extends over all lines of Canadian Northern Railway east of Port Arthur and east of O'Brien on the Transcontinental and over the former Canadian Government Railways.

2. Mr. Warren's salary is \$10,000 per annum and Mr. Brady's is \$12,000 per annum.

3. Mr. Warren's headquarters are at Winnipeg, and Mr. Brady's headquarters are at Montreal.

4. Mr. C. A. Hayes is employed by Canadian National Railways as Vice-President in charge of traffic; his salary is \$12,000 per annum.

5. Mr. Hayes was General Manager of Canadian Government Railways, Eastern Lines; his salary was \$12,000 per annum.
