the tube industry is in decline at the same time the transistor industry is growing and I can demonstrate quite easily that there are more jobs now being created in the transistor industry than are being lost in the tube industry.

JURISDICTION OVER SABLE ISLAND

GRAIN

INTERNATIONAL GRAINS ARRANGEMENT—DIS-CUSSION OF STATUS WITH REPRESENTA-TIVES OF EXPORTING NATIONS

Mr. R. R. Southam (Qu'Appelle-Moose Mountain): I have a question for the Minister without Portfolio who reports to the House for the Canadian Wheat Board. In view of the minister's announcement that a meeting will be held in Ottawa on May 4 and 5 with representatives of major wheat exporting nations, including a spokesman for the European Common Market, to discuss, among other things, limitations of wheat acreages, can the minister advise the House whether discussions on the present status of the International Grains Arrangement will take place, and will he and his advisers impress upon the United States representatives the importance of strengthening the International Grains Arrangement to prevent any further pricecutting by our competitors?

Hon. Otto E. Lang (Minister without Portfolio): The meetings in question are essentially to discuss production policies. There will be meetings later among interested countries in connection with the International Grains Arrangement. Of course we are always making our views known to our friends in the United States about the importance of the International Grains Arrangement.
