CANADIAN COUNCIL ON SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT POVERTY STATISTICS

Mrs. Margaret Mitchell (Vancouver East): Madam Speaker, I hope the Prime Minister will be as loquacious in answer to this question.

Some Hon. Members: Oh, oh!

Mr. Murphy: I think the Liberals are sensitive again.

Mrs. Mitchell: Poverty statistics released yesterday by the Canadian Council on Social Development are a terrible indictment of the Liberal Government's policy on economics in Canada. There were 3.5 million Canadians living in poverty in 1980 and at least a million more have been added to that total, including single parents, working parents, unemployed, as well as senior citizens. How does the Prime Minister justify the scandalous poverty situation, which has resulted from his own Government's deliberate policies of high unemployment, parttime jobs, the six and five wage controls, and the abandonment of a guaranteed income policy?

Right Hon. P. E. Trudeau (Prime Minister): Madam Speaker, I am afraid I did not catch the gist of the question. The Hon. Member is asking a series of questions on Government policy. We are explaining them every day. The six and five program, for instance, has in effect succeeded in bringing

down inflation from a high of 12.5 per cent to something like 8 per cent or 9 per cent now, and this percentage is still declining. We could talk of every one of our policies, including the ones we adopted when the Government was first elected, the increase in the Guaranteed Income Supplement, and these are all areas where the Government is conscious of the importance of helping first those who need help the most.

Miss MacDonald: Like Donald Macdonald.

Mrs. Mitchell: Madam Speaker, that is a very unclear, uncaring answer from a millionaire Prime Minister.
