am concerned about, however, and quite frankly, I think the financial institutions in question should be satisfied with a three-month payment, and I am now re-examining—

LABOUR CONDITIONS

UNEMPLOYMENT IN BOW RIVER CONSTITUENCY—ALLOCATION OF FUNDS

Mr. Gordon Taylor (Bow River): Madam Speaker, my question is for the Minister of Employment and Immigration. In 1982, 685 people were unemployed in Bow River and we received a grant of \$200,000. In 1983, 1,893 people were unemployed and we received a grant of \$100,000. Could the Minister outline the formula that gives this result?

Hon. John Roberts (Minister of Employment and Immigration): Yes, Madam Speaker. Indeed, the formula is outlined in the correspondence that was sent to the Hon. Member and he might refer to it. In the allocation of funds under the Canada Works Program, which is the equivalent of the Community Development Program of the past, a minimum of \$100,000 was spent for the constituency and the rest of the funds was allocated to those areas which had a higher than average labour surplus rate. The information is contained in the material that has already been sent to the Hon. Member. He can find it in great detail in that kit.

Mr. Taylor: Madam Speaker, it is an odd formula that provides that, the higher the unemployment, the lower the grant.

APPLICATION OF GRANT FORMULA

Mr. Gordon Taylor (Bow River): Madam Speaker, I should like to ask the Hon. Minister if the same formula is used in the ridings held by Liberal Members.

UNITED EMPIRE LOYALISTS

BICENTENNIAL ACTIVITIES IN ONTARIO

Mr. Bill Vankoughnet (Hastings-Frontenac-Lennox and Addington): Madam Speaker, my question is for the Secretary of State. On previous occasions I have asked the Minister what he would do to assist the United Empire Loyalists' bicentennial activities in the Province of Ontario during 1984. At that time he indicated the possibility of joint financing. What is the Government presently doing to encourage United Empire Loyalists' bicentennial activities in the Province of Ontario during 1984?

Hon. Serge Joyal (Secretary of State): Madam Speaker, I am pleased to announce to the House that I have already written to the Intergovernmental Affairs Minister of Ontario to announce that the Canadian Government would participate in the celebration of the centennial of the major early settlements of Ontario. There is no doubt but that in forthcoming days a detailed statement will come from us explaining how the plans will be implemented.

Mr. Vankoughnet: Madam Speaker, this event marks a very significant and important aspect of the heritage of Canada, and I certainly hope the Minister will take it under consideration very soon.

FUNDING OF CELEBRATIONS

Mr. Bill Vankoughnet (Hastings-Frontenac-Lennox and Addington): Madam Speaker, I should like to ask the Minister what plans are under way to make funds available. Does the Minister have anything concrete to tell us? Many municipalities, organizations and individuals are making plans, but they do not know how far to go. Does the Minister have anything to tell them now—not weeks or months from now, but today?

Hon. Serge Joyal (Secretary of State): Yes, Madam Speaker. Our plans are twofold. Money will be made available for the enrichment of already existing programs such as that of the Canada War Museums which has put together an exhibition on the Loyalist history of the country, that will tour Ontario; the enrichment of the Fort William activities; the
