THE ADVERB.

§75. An Adverb is a word which modifies the meaning of a verb, adjective or an other adverb or adverbial phrase.

§76. Adverbs are of two classes: *Simple* and *Compound*.

A *Simple Adverb* is an adverb of one word; as, ainmle, *seldom*; bhos, *on this side*; eia, *how*; cionnus, *after what manner*.

A *Compound Adverb* is an adverb consisting of two words; as, gu brònach, *sorrowfully*; gu h-ole, *badly*; am feasd, *for ever*.

A compound adverb may be formed from any adjective by prefixing the preposition **gu** (equivalent to the English postfix *-ly*); as, gu dona, *badly*; gu peacach, *sinfully*.

An adverbial phrase is a phrase having an adverbial signification and consisting of more than two words; as, a h-uile uair, *every time*; cho luath agus, *as soon as*.

THE PREPOSITION.

§77. A Preposition is a word placed before a noun or pronoun to show its relation to some other word or phrase in a sentence.

§78. Prepositions are of two classes: *Simple* and *Compound*.

A Simple Preposition is a preposition consisting of one word.
