## ANOTHER DECLINE IN WHEAT PRICE

Cancellation of Export Contracts Was Depressing Influence at Chicago.

CHICAGO, Aug. 13.—Accumulating domestic stocks and the cancelling of export contracts had a depressing influence today on the price of wheat.

The market closed heavy at 3-4c to 1-1-4c net decline. Corn showed a loss of 1-2c to 1-1-4c, compared with last night, and oats of 1-3c to 1-1-4c.

In provisions the outcome was the same as last night to 10c off.

Prospective difficulties in regard to the financing of wheat supplies that can find no outlet to Europe, began to tell distinctly today against prices.

Notwithstanding that conservative traders doubted whether any fears in this respect were justified, the dealers in the pit were constantly made aware that seaboard exporters were trying to sell here, and when unable to do so were hedging for sales of various futures.

Rallies Didn't Last.

Rallies which took place at times today in the wheat market failed to hold. The chief encouragement for the upturn was the hope that the conference between exporters and Secretary McAdoo tomorrow would bring about some beneficial result. One thing specially looked forward to was a possible arrangement whereby American exporters would be able to collect promptly payment for shipments seized by the British Government.

Additional rains over Nebraska and other big producing states tended to lower the price of corn. The September option held relatively firm, although Illinois and Iowa country dealers showed decidedly more disposition to sell. Oats were partly sustained by rumors of export sales.

Trade in provisions today was the smallest since the outbreak of war. Weakness of grain acted as more than an offset to the fact that hog receipts were less numerous than looked for.

## OUTSIDE DEALING IS DISCOURAGED

Brokers Busy Attending to Details—Victory for Allies Would Help.

Local brokerage offices present an appearance which might be described as "busy with calm."

The absence of any stock quotations is quite noticeable, while no trading is being done, and even a suggestion is frowned upon, there appears to be considerable work on hand.

The odds and ends, straggling accounts and in fact all those little details which in the first days of excitement were overlooked or otherwise neglected, are gradually being cleared up.

A great many enquiries are received daily as to the possible date of reopening the exchange. Each enquirer, however, is informed that three days' notice will be given in the event of such a decision being arrived at. The same length of time will be given in Montreal as regards the exchange there.

Other than keeping posted on the latest war news, there is little to be done with the exception of the clerical work mentioned. Outside dealing is highly discouraged. The more optimistic state that in the event of an important victory for the allies, there would be a manifestation of confidence and a consequent rise in the value of business would be considerably nearer.
