cafe he muft fail as well as we, and owing to the fame caufe, want of numbers.

Couid the junction have taken place, we might bid defiance to united ftrencth, of French, Indians, and Canadians.

There can be but little hopes of taking the place by affault, for though the Men of war might be of infinite fervice in :lencing the batteries of the Lower Town, yet the greateft, and indeed an almoftinfurmountable difficulty would yet remain; for the few paffages that lead from the Upper to the lower town are ftrongly intrenched, and our hips can by no means reach the upper batteries.
