

BUFFALO EASY FOR TORONTO

Hunt Polo Team Gets Revenge For Saturday's Defeat in Exhibition Game.

BUFFALO, Aug. 20.—(Special.)—The Toronto Hunt Club poloists avenged their defeat of Saturday by the Buffalo Country Club team in the international championship series match. This afternoon's exhibition game, played on the local club grounds, resulted in a decisive victory for the visiting Canadian four by a score of 8 to 2.

After the defeat handed Buffalo earlier in the season at Toronto, this gives the Hunt Club the majority of games played against the Country Club, two to one. Superlative team play and aggressive riding by Toronto in the match today. While it was not until the second half that the Canadians began to really draw away from Buffalo, their play in every department throughout was better than that of Buffalo.

Captain McMillan and Gordon Beardmore featured for the Blue and Yellow, the former shooting five of Toronto's eight goals. Bielstein was the only Country Club man in the line-up who scored the "hat-trick" in Saturday's Avenir Cup contest.

Steele and Goodyear played brilliantly as individuals, but Buffalo lacked noticeably when it came to team play and following up advantages.

The turf was rather slippery and soon was cut up in bad shape, hindering accurate shooting. There was a large and appreciable gallery in attendance. As a result of Toronto's victory, the Country Club polo trophies become the temporary possession of the Hunt Club.

The game began 12:30 o'clock. McMillan, after a few minutes of see-saw play, took the ball down the field, and without difficulty scored the first goal.

In the second period the Country Club overtook the Buffalo and sent the white ball between the flags.

A second tally by McMillan and a safety by Goodyear contributed one point more to Toronto's score and brought Buffalo down 4-2. At half-time, with no scoring in the fourth period, Toronto led, 3 to 2.

Thereafter everything was Toronto. Leading play scored two more goals in the fifth and three more in the sixth gave Toronto the contest they and Score Hunt Club 7, Buffalo 1. Bielstein having shot a goal for the Country Club in the sixth period.

In the seventh Buffalo played in considerably better form, Goodyear getting the only score of the period for the Country Club. McMillan retaliating by a goal in the eighth and final period. The game was called the score stood Toronto 8, Buffalo 2.
