RIGHT THE WRONG.

Insurance Officials Must Aid the Enquiry Commission.

Montreal, March 23.—(Special.)—The Star says editorially this evening: "Then there was the making of a couple of 'call loans' to Mackenzie and Mann by the Manufacturers' Life on securities upon which the company could not legally make loans."

It was the money held by the Manufacturers' Life in trust for their policyholders. Mackenzie and Mann were in the position of trustees, taking trust funds for their own use and offering for them securities which the law of Canada explicitly declares as insufficient.

SEBKS TARIFF INFORMATION. (Canadian Associated Press Cable.) London, March 23.—Lord Ribblesdale places the following notice on the order paper of the house of lords for debate: To call attention to the growth of imports from the United Kingdom into Canada, under the preferential tariff, to move the return showing the imports of merchandise into Canada from the United Kingdom, United States and Germany respectively, distinguishing between dutiable and free goods, from 1890 to 1904.

IRILEY IS SEATED. Ottawa, March 23.—(Special.)—Hon. Gen. Iriley, who resigned his seat in the commons for Victoria, was this afternoon introduced in the senate by Hon. R. W. Scott and Senator Bostock.

DEATH LIST OF 21. Grafton, W. Va., March 23.—Twenty-one miners lost their lives in yesterday's mine explosion at Century, W. Va. The bodies recovered were torn and mangled, and in many cases burned from head to foot, making the work of identification very hard.

NOAH CITED AS PRECEDENT.

Shippingmen's Protest Against New Sunday Law Restrictions.

Ottawa, March 23.—(Special.)—A petition was presented in the house today by Mr. Bickerdike (St. Antoine, Montreal) against the provisions of the proposed Sunday Observance Act—so far as they relate to shipping. The petition is signed by Hugh A. Allan, president, and James Robb, secretary of the Shipping Federation. It sets forth that if the ship were to arrive at Quebec on Sunday it would land its immigrants, but would be compelled to remain in port until Monday.

Berlin, March 23.—(Special.)—Justice Britton, who came to Waterloo to attend the annual meeting of the Mutual Life of Canada, was taken suddenly ill with erysipelas, and is now at the Berlin and Waterloo Hospital.
