ROSEBERY CONDEMNS
"POISONOUS SYSTEM"

Conservative Peers Delighted, But Doubt Effect of Fiery Champion's Address.

LONDON, Aug. 14.—Lord Rosebery made another of his meteoric appearances in the house of lords last night and delivered an able speech against the government. With great rhetorical brilliancy he denounced the government's Scottish small land owners' bill.

Lord Rosebery declared that he wished the government well, but he ridiculed its efforts to legislate for Scotland. His complaint was that the bill in question would "crocheterize" Scotland. In the most scathing manner and with an abundance of dramatic gesticulation, the speaker declared he would not be a party to the introduction into the healthy body politics of Scotland of the "poisonous billiculus of the Irish-American system."

The Conservative peers were delighted and cheered Lord Rosebery to the echo. His speech was the event of the evening, but the Conservatives themselves doubt whether it will have much practical effect.

PAPER MILLS STRIKER FINED FOR DESERTION

Magistrate Holds He Endangered Company's Property by Going on Strike.

NORTH BAY, Aug. 14.—(Special.)—The plant of the Imperial Paper Co. at Sturgeon Falls still practically shut down, although an attempt is being made to operate the pulp mill, but with meagre results. Labor troubles have tied up the mill since spring. First the papermakers struck on account of a difference over Sunday labor, and, finally the pulp workers walked out when non-union papermakers, imported from Wisconsin, were introduced.

As an unfavorable outcome of this case was not anticipated, the employees paid very little attention to their defence, but the new cases brought against them will be fought to the last ditch, and it is expected that the general principle involved will enlist the sympathy and aid of other organized trades. The strike has injured the town, and business is practically at a standstill, but settlement seems as distant as ever, and the management will not meet the officials of the international union.

COMMITTEE TO PROBE CHARGES OF CORRUPTION

Heated Debate in Convention of Boot and Shoe Workers Over Last Year's Election.

Delegates to the International Boot and Shoe Workers' convention at yesterday morning's session resumed the discussion as to the means to be employed in dealing with the charges of bribery and corruption made by President Tobin against T. B. Hickey of Boston, Mass., and Collis Lovey of St. Louis.

The last two were candidates for the position of president and vice-president, and it is alleged that they resorted to unfair and dishonorable methods to secure election to the respective offices of the organization.

The executive recommended that a special committee be appointed to enquire into the charges and report to the convention.

The heated debate, but the majority favored the proposition. Finally it was decided to appoint a committee of five, three to be nominated by the delegates assembled and two by the executive.
