AN OFFICIAL STATEMENT

Shows a Flourishing State of Affairs
in Imperial Finances.

Nearly £250,000,000 Received by the Exchequer in Six Months—Not Exceeding Over Two Millions—The Expected Increase at Athens Did Not Eventuate—Ottawa Despatch to the London Times Says a Pro-British Tariff in Canada Will Follow the Expiration of the German Treaties—General News by Cable.

London, Sept. 30.—According to an official statement issued to-day, Great Britain's revenue for the six months just ended was £49,807,448. This is a net increase of £2,033,345 upon the revenue for the corresponding period of last year. Of the grand total, £7,634,982 was derived from death duties.

SITUATION AT ATHENS.

The Expected Crisis Avoided by the Generalship of the Premier.

London, Oct. 1.—The Athens correspondent of The Times says: M. Rallis, when presenting to the Chamber the preliminary treaty of peace, took strong exception to its terms, and attributed to Germany all that had been done against Greece.

He declared that he would not submit to a resolution approving the treaty, as it was executed and, therefore, did not require approval, and also because such a step would be contrary to the sovereign rights of the state and the crown.

M. Delanyannis expressed his approval of the position, but asked the Government for again asking a vote of confidence, as this had already been accorded. Therefore, presuming that the Government was actuated by other reasons, M. Delanyannis said that he would withhold his support. The vote was then taken.

THE WAR IS OVER

As Far as Monarchs are Concerned, But There is Trouble Yet Elsewhere.

Simla, Sept. 30.—The campaign against the Monarchs has been successfully continued, and nothing now remains but to collect the fines. The Upper Provinces have been severely punished, and the Lower Provinces, by the success of the British troops, are accepting the terms of the British commanders.

Raiders are looting in the vicinity of Haug.

A force of insurgent tribesmen attacked Sudda yesterday, but were easily repulsed.

All the English women have been removed to places of safety in the Kurram Valley.

NOW RUSSIA BOASTS UP

Her Intrigues with Afghanistan Have Failed and She is Dead About It.

Paris, Sept. 30.—A despatch to The Politique Coloniale from St. Petersburg says the Afghan mission to Russia has departed, bearing the promise of Russian support in the event of Great Britain's encroachment upon the Amir's territory. The despatch says negotiations between Russia and Afghanistan continue with the object of establishing a league to oppose the British advance in Africa, and it is added that Russia is about to reach an understanding with the United States, with the view of arresting the extension of the British Empire in the Pacific.

A NEW COMBINATION

Newspaper to be Started at Moscow to Boom Anglo-Russian Trade.

London, Oct. 1.—The correspondent of The Times at St. Petersburg says: A new Anglo-Russian newspaper, printed in the Russian language, is about to be published at Moscow, as part of the scheme of promotion of commercial relations between England and Russia. The paper will also serve as the organ of the Imperial Russian Agriculture Society of Moscow, which will use its influence to increase the sale of Russian and English manufactures, especially machinery and agricultural implements. The paper will point out that the present moment is especially favorable to an increased development of the intercourse between the two countries.

The Dingley tariff may result in a considerable decline of British exports to America and a diminution of American exports of raw material and foodstuffs to England, which will be calculated to facilitate Russian exports to England.

A PRO-BRITISH TARIFF

To be Adopted by Canada (or the German Treaties Go Out of Force).

London, Sept. 30.—The Times' Ottawa correspondent says, on the highest authority, that after the expiration in July, 1918, of the commercial treaties now in force, Canada will adopt a tariff that will be essentially pro-British.

A Cure for Tuberculosis

Berlin, Sept. 30.—Prof. Landauer of Stuttgart, who has been experimenting for years in the treatment of tuberculosis, has treated 400 patients with a soluble salt of cinchona bark. He believes that almost all the patients so treated have been permanently cured.

Count Okuma Was a Hand In

London, Sept. 30.—The Manchester Guardian says that Count Okuma, the Japanese Foreign Minister, is likely to represent Japan in the Berlin Peace Conference at Washington, not on account of the exceptional importance of the Berlin Sea controversy, but because of other important matters between Japan and the United States, the settlement of which he is doing his utmost to assist. Among the questions in

the settlement of which he wishes to take part are those of immigration, the Dingley tariff and the Hawaiian dispute.

Great Filling of Due to the Strike.—Glasgow, Sept. 30.—The Clyde Shipbuilding returns for August show that only 10 vessels, aggregating 8000 tons, were launched as against an average of 25 vessels, with an average tonnage of 45,000. The falling off is due to the dispute between the employers and the engineers, resulting in the strike of the latter.

British Subjects Want Relief

Brussels, Sept. 30.—At a meeting held last night by British subjects to protest against the new Belgian law compelling foreigners to serve in the civil guard, resolutions were passed requesting the British Government to take steps to relieve British subjects in Belgium from liability to serve in either military or auxiliary service under any other than the British sovereign.

Italy's New Warship

Rome, Sept. 29.—The new cruiser Emanuele Filiberto was launched at Castellone, on the Bay of Naples, to-day, amid the greatest enthusiasm on the part of an immense gathering. The launching took place in the presence of the Prince and Princess of Naples, Admiral Brin, Minister of Marine, and a large party of prominent persons, including a number of officers of the Italian navy. The new ship has a tonnage of 9750, is 365 feet long and 39 feet wide. She will be fitted with an exceptionally powerful armament.

Can Save His Soul Yet

Vienna, Sept. 30.—The Pope, on the intercession of Cardinal Gruscha, Archbishop of Vienna, has telegraphed to Prime Minister Badeni giving him absolution for having fought a duel with Dr. Wolf, the leader of the German Nationalists in the Reichsrath, in which Count Badeni was wounded in the arm. According to the rules of the Catholic Church, Count Badeni, if he did not receive absolution, would have to be excommunicated.

Bank of England Statement

London, Sept. 30.—The weekly statement of the Bank of England shows the following changes, as compared with the previous account: Total reserves, decreased £1,331,000; Circulation, increased £1,061,000; bullion, decreased £270,337; Other securities, increased £318,749; Other deposits, decreased £271,000; notes reserve, decreased £1,290,000; Government securities unchanged. The proportion of the Bank of England reserve to liability, which last week was 50.10 per cent, is now 48.37 per cent. The Bank of England's rate of discount remains unchanged at 2-1/2 per cent.

THE BRIDE CAME NOT

Her Father Heard of the Proposed Wedding and Took His Daughter Back to Her Canadian Home.

Holyoke, Mass., Sept. 30.—Miss Delina Dugos and Frank Degraff were to have been married to-day, but the ceremony was indefinitely postponed owing to the unexpected absence of the prospective bride. Miss Dugos was employed in the Lyman mills and her parents reside in Canada. Her parents heard of the intended marriage and were opposed to it. Her father appeared at her wedding last night, and, flourishing a revolver, demanded to see his daughter. When confronted by her father she fled, and her father was determined and the two boarded the train for Montreal.

CATTLE WITH LUMP JAW

Have Been Sold to Winnipeg Butchers and the Government Have Stepped In—Big Increase in Clearing House Returns.

Winnipeg, Sept. 30.—(Special.)—Dealers have been selling cattle suffering from lump jaw to city butchers and the Government has found it necessary to step in and prohibit the same by a special act of the Cabinet in council.

Winnipeg clearing house returns for the past week were \$2,900,000, or more than double those for the same period last year.

TAMMANY'S SELECTIONS.

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HON. MR. HARDY AT STRATHROY.

He Strongly Defended His Government, Denying With the Timber Question and the Englewood License.

Strathroy, Sept. 30.—Premier Hardy and Hon. G. W. Ross held a meeting here to-night. They were enthusiastically received by a large crowd on the arrival of the train from the east. Accompanied by the I.O.R. band and a large crowd following they were escorted to the Lyceum, where a full house greeted them.

L. H. Smith, President of the Strathroy Liberal Association, acted as chairman. The hall was appropriately decorated with banners and flags. The ladies were very much in evidence, the front seats and overflow seats on the platform being crowded.

Mr. W. S. Calvert, M.P., was the first speaker, and spoke for about fifteen minutes, followed by Mr. Taylor, M.L.A., who spoke briefly.

Hon. Mr. Hardy was the next speaker, and was enthusiastically received. The hon. gentleman dealt very explicitly with the timber license and export and alien clauses, the Sandfield Macdonald surplus and the Englewood license, and vigorously defended his Government.

Hon. G. W. Ross followed as the Premier, and was very kindly received by his old townsmen and electors of West Middlesex. He took up the educational branch of the Government and concluded his speech with a pleasant reference to his twenty-five years of service to the constituency. Whether or not he had failed he had tried to do his best, and he hoped there was still some room of service in this old racked body of his.

The meeting closed with cheers for the Queen, the Premier and Hon. G. W. Ross.

YANTIC WOULD BE NOWHERE

In an Encounter With One of the "Modern Fighting Ships" Which Canada Has on the Lakes.

The Washington correspondent of The Detroit Evening News sends the following to his paper, dated Sept. 29:

A New York paper says definite orders have been issued for the shipment of a battery of rapid-firing guns to Erie, Pa., there to be placed upon the corvette Yantic, as she passes on her way to become the training ship of the Michigan naval reserve.

The paper attaches great importance to this, claiming that it will amount to a violation of the diplomatic agreement limiting the number of war vessels Uncle Sam and J. Bull shall maintain on the great lakes. It is claimed to be highly probable that England may send 60 or 80 small warships to the lakes, to bring the United States to a realizing sense of the situation, and that the only way will be for us to build a corresponding fleet for the lakes.

At the Navy Department they scoff at the whole idea, and say that the same time do not deny that the modern battleship will be sent to Erie. This is about the way they talked to the News: "We would not want to arm the Yantic for? She is only good for about seven knots. If we were going to start a gun battle with England we would place the guns upon some of the 20-knot boats on the lakes."

Conductor J. J. Downey on the way to follow up an imaginary scheme to make a modern fighting machine out of the Yantic, why don't you people up there get after those Canadian revenue cruisers on the great lakes. We know all about them. They're regular modern ships, with torpedoes, machine guns, and the ammunition for them is ready at hand, in the Dominion."

The Yantic is one of the oldest vessels in our navy. She is a wooden ship, built in 1864. Her displacement is 900 tons, her speed 8 1/2 knots and her armament 225. She carries two nine-inch smooth bore guns, one 12-pounder breech-loading gun and one 3-pounder breech-loading howitzer. Her guns, however, will have to be removed in order to conform to the requirements of the agreement between the United States and Great Britain, limiting the number of armed vessels on the great lakes.
