MYSTERIOUS DOUBLE CRIME.

Baby Killed and Mother Fatally Injured by Burglars—No Clue to the Perpetrators.

New York, Aug. 26.—A mother and the babe sleeping in the crib beside her were murdered by burglars in Brooklyn Tuesday in the dark of early morning.

The mother lay in all probability, die, as she was struck a terrible blow in the forehead. She was still unconscious at a late hour yesterday.

It is thought that her skull was fractured. Several physicians were in attendance upon her, and they feared her death at any moment.

All of the bureau, dressing case and closet drawers were found drawn open and ransacked. A considerable quantity of jewelry was stolen, and the burglars left no trace either of their entrance or exit.

The dying woman is Mrs. Anna De Witt of No. 71 Penn-street and the dead baby was her 22-months-old son, Joseph.

For a moment after her plight was discovered she was conscious. But in that time she only moaned: "I've been struck, and I can't move." She never spoke again.

It is known of the brutal murder of the child and the attack upon Mrs. De Witt has been given to the police by her brother, Joseph R. Houghton, a fourth-year student at the law school.
