JULY MEET FELL 2 CENTS.

Sharp Slump in American Wheat Fu-
tures Yesterday.

Paris Wheat Declined—Reports of
Better Outlook in American
Wheat Belts—Cora Declined in
Sympathy—World's Visible De-
crease for the Past Week—Notes
and Gossip of a Day.

Tuesday Evening, April 25.
Liverpool wheat futures were inclined to
go higher this morning, but closed at fig-
ures unchanged from Monday's final quotat-
ions.

Paris wheat declined 20 to 40 centimes.
Antwerp was a fraction higher.

Chicago wheat futures slumped today,
losing all the gain of Monday, and a good
part of a cent a bushel besides. The unsat-
isfactory cables and the prevalence of good
weather in the wheat belts were the
depressing factors. The May option fell
1/2 cent, and the July and September corre-
sponding day 1/4 cent.

Liverpool maize futures were little
changed since Monday. Chicago corn de-
clined half a cent to-day, and closed near
the bottom.

Wheat receipts at Liverpool the past three
days were 210,000 cwt., of which 150,000 cwt.
were American. Corn same time, 67,
100 cwt.

Manitoba wheat shipments the past week
600 bushels; malt, 328,000 bushels.
Bradstreet's returns for the past week
show a decrease in the world's available
wheat supply of 3,773,000 bushels.

Wheat receipts at Minneapolis and Du-
luth to-day, 108 cars, against 383 the cor-
responding day of 1889.

Exports at New York to-day: Flour, 17,
131 barrels and 510 sacks; wheat, 19,555
bushels.

LOCAL LIVE STOCK
The receipts of live stock at the Cattle
Market were fair—large, 32 car loads, con-
siderable.

The bulk of which were light exporters,
butchers' cattle again being scarce.

Trade was slow, especially for ship-
pers. In fact, the market was a repetition of last
Friday, butchers' cattle being scarce; prices
for these were steady. Montreal's heavy
buying light exporters instead.

Many of the dealers in exporters did little
or nothing, having a number of cattle
on hand that they are unable to ship for
want of space on the boats, navigation not
having opened. Montreal's heavy buyers
will not open for a week or ten days.

Under these circumstances, it is un-
likely that the market will be very active
until there is plenty of space avail-
able on the boats.

Exporters' Choice heavy export cattle
are worth from \$4.80 to \$5 per cwt., al-
though we saw only a few picked lots at
the latter price, and did not hear of any
lots bringing that figure; light exporters
sold at \$4.40 to \$4.50 per cwt.

Export Butts—Heavy export butts of good
quality, \$3.85 to \$4.25; light export butts,
\$3.25 to \$3.65 per cwt.

Loads of good butchers and exporters,
mixed, sold at \$4.45 to \$4.65 per cwt.

Butchers' Cattle—Equal in quality to the
best exporters, weighing 1000 to 1100 lbs.
being used, at \$4.50 to \$4.55 per cwt.

Loads of good butchers' cattle sold at
\$4.25 to \$4.50 per cwt. Those of the
quality were scarce and firmer at \$4.12 to
\$4.25 per cwt.

Common butchers' cattle sold at \$3.70 to
\$3.80, and inferior at \$3.40 to \$3.50 per cwt.

Stocks—Buffalo stockers were in good
demand, prices from \$3.20 to \$3.30, in-
ferior to medium, and \$3.75 to \$4 for
good, while a few picked lots brought \$4.15
to \$4.25 per cwt.

Feeders—There was a good trade done in
heavy feeders. Well-bred steers, weighing
1000 to 1100 lbs., sold at \$4.25 to \$4.40
per cwt.

Stock Heifers—A few heifers for stock
purpose sold at \$3 per cwt.

Stock Bulls—Inferior stock bulls sold at
\$2.50 per cwt. Good bulls, weighing 1000
lbs., sold at \$3.50 to \$3.75 per cwt.

Feeder Bulls—Bulls suitable for the byres
are worth about \$3 to \$3.50 per cwt.
