Backed Solely By J. W. Flavelle, He Will Go Into Independent Journalism, Acquiring or Establishing a Daily Paper in the City of Toronto-Mr. Jaffray Talks the Matter Over With Premier Ross.

Failing that, a paper will be brought into being, and then let the corporations beware! The announcement of Mr. Willison's resignation, made exclusively thru The World Friday morning, startled the city. President Jaffray of the Board of Directors of The Globe received the letter of resignation on Thursday morning, and yesterday afternoon conferred with Premier Ross, a rother director. The Board of Directors met yesterday afternoon and decided to ask Mr. Willison to reconsider, but he will not. Sir Wilfrid Laurier was seen by Mr. Willison in Ottawa prior to the Premier's departure for Hot Springs, Va., and was told of the contemplated abdication of his able supporter. It is even stated that Hon. Mr. sifton was cognizant of the situation. At any rate, it is well known that Mr. Sifton is a strong friend of J. W. Flavelle. 

The Globe during the term of my editorship have been agreeable and barmonlous, and, so far as I know, I leave the paper on the best of terms with the beard and the staff, In entering the field of independent journalism, I will be associated with Mr. J. W. Flavelle. He will supply the capital, and all the capital, for the new venture. No money will come from any other source. It is the distinct and clearly-expressed understanding that the paper to be acquired or established thall not be the organ of any political party or of any organized interest, and shall be absolutely independent of all business and corporate enterprises. The only objects in view are free and frank discussion of public questions, in no spirit of hostility to any party, and without regard to the effects upon any party to debate public questions only upon public grounds, to further in a same, rational and practical way all movements which seem to make for the public betterment, and, above all things, not to employ the paper for the premotion of the private interests of

any individual or group of individuals, Some Further Facts, Mr. Willison further intimated that his resignation would take place almost immediately, and that he would commence his duties in connection with the new enterprise at once. In answer to the question as to whether it was the intention to acquire an existing property or to establish a new one, Mr. Willison said: "We have made offers, but no newspaper is obliged to sell simply because we offer the price.

If they do not want to sell, then all well and good, for they have as much right to be in the newspaper business as we have, but we would naturally rather begin on the basis of an existing property than establish a new one. There is no doubt, however, about the paper going on. That is an absolute certainty.

J. W. Flavelle, who is controlling the capital behind the proposed new daily paper to be established with J. S. Willioon. late editor of The Globe, at its head, will not deny or affirm the part attributed to him in the arrangement.
