A .- In answer to this question ently it was incorrectly stated that his man, if in the C. E. F., was not this man, if in the C. E. F., was not eligible for post-discharge pay. Under an amendment to the regulations, he is entitled to post-discharge pay. He is not entitled to the three months pay granted to those who have gone overseas, but he is entitled to pay on the same basis as members of the active militia on active service in Canada. For your two years' continuous service you would get one month's pay of your rank.
