ENFORCEMENT OF TRAFFIC BYLAW TO BE STRICTER

Police Commission Will Be Asked To Tighten It.

The police commission will be asked to more strictly enforce the traffic regulations in the city. The board of control discussed the question when the recommendation of No. 2 committee, that traffic officers be stationed at King and York, corners of Richmond street, was read.

Controller E. S. Little said that the drivers of cars should be forced to keep to the right in making turns at all corners. It was also suggested that the drivers of cars should be forced to stop at intersections.

Controller Merryfield said that there were many dangerous points. He mentioned Dundas and Wellington streets.

Controller Little suggested that the curbing at all corners might be moved in close to the walks, allowing for a rounded corner, with a standard in the centre, which all cars would have to go around.

The case was referred to the police commission.

City Clerk Baker also called attention to the speed at which the militia ambulances travel along Adelaide street. Thursday night, he said, he saw one going at an awful rate. There were three little children in the road and his heart jumped up in his mouth. It said that these cars travel at a speed of from 40 miles an hour up, about the stretch from the C. P. R. tracks to Queen's avenue. The residents of the neighborhood daily look for a fatal accident.

Horrors! Dandelion Wine In Booze Class, Declares Inspector

Those Who Make Favorite Old Drink Must Beware.

Home brewers of dandelion wine are liable to be charged with a breach of the Ontario temperance act, says License Inspector J. E. Keenleyside. There will no doubt be some unwelcome news, as many citizens are making the beverage this year who never thought of it before.

While the wine, when first made, is strong, it is stated that it gives it the kick which might be dangerous to persons as high as 40 to 50 per cent proof. Keenleyside says it has been known to produce a similar effect to that of alcohol, and the inspector asserts this and similar drinks which test over the 24 per cent and as the limit is 24 per cent, the inspector says it is a special reference to these home-made wines, but they are covered by the act, and the inspector says that the beverage is likely to become one of man's great temptations as a result of this ruling of the license inspectors.

CITY FIGHTING FOR EXTENSION OF LIMITS ON EXPRESS DELIVERY

Companies Would Give Service on Paved Streets Only.

The express companies strongly object to making deliveries in London on unpaved streets. In an application for an extension of limits has been made to the Dominion Railway Board, and the express companies are preparing to fight it.

He said that the companies had been placed in their bonded warehouse, and that they are in bond five minutes or five days.

An appeal may be taken to the Dominion Railway Board against this new charge.

A large number of men throughout this military district, who have been raised to higher medical categories after re-examinations, are being ordered before tribunals.

These men will be given an opportunity of making claim for exemption on some other grounds, as they cannot be exempted on medical category grounds alone if found either in A or B categories.

Preparations are being made for general re-examination throughout the district when medical boards will sit in a number of towns and cities.

MOTORIZATION OF FIRE DEPARTMENT AGAIN BROUGHT UP

Controllers Advocate Light Trucks for Outside Halls.

That the days of the horse-drawn fire apparatus in London should be quickly ended is the opinion of the members of the board of control. The question was discussed on Friday. Fire Chief John Aitken was recently authorized to purchase four horses, and now another is dead, making five necessary.

Controller J. M. Moore said that he would sooner see the horses done away with and light trucks purchased instead. He said that the horses kept in the north end station made the trip down town three times the other night. It was too hard on them. He said that other horses were purchased lighter trucks for the outside stations. The trucks of two light trucks would not be equal to the horsepower of the horses.

Controller Little suggested that light trucks be secured for the outside stations and the horses kept for the heavier equipment necessary for the downtown sections.

It was decided to recommend to No. 1 committee to have the chief prepare a report on the question. There is no money to purchase the trucks this year, but the controllers suggested that they could be ready for next year.

BULK OF CONTRACTS FOR CLOTHING GOES TO PREVIOUS BIDDER

Fire Department Uniforms To Be Made By Greene-Swift.

Greene-Swift, Limited, has received the bulk of the contracts for making fire department uniforms, awarded by the board of control.

QUERIES REGARDING MILITARY SERVICE

Send in Your Problems and They Will Be Answered From Official Information by The Advertiser.

APPIN. Q.—1. What is the address of the registrar-general?

2. I am a married man. What papers shall I carry?

3. Will I have to send my marriage certificate to get a copy?

—1. Parliament Buildings, Toronto, Ont.

2. A copy of your marriage certificate.

3. You can get a copy from the clerk of your municipality if the marriage was performed there. Otherwise you can get it from the registrar-general of the province where the marriage was performed.

NORTHWOOD. Q.—What are the chances of a 22 man, 22 years old, obtaining leave of absence for farming?

A.—Only the A men of that age have been called. If he is not called, when the B men will be called. No information regarding what leave will be granted them when called is available. It would seem that you would have good chances of obtaining leave on agricultural grounds, but all depends on how pressing is the need for men. If you were the sole support of dependents you might also get leave, if they would suffer serious hardship by your enlistment.

PARIS. Q.—1. A man in category A is within the draft age, and his exemption expires June 1. If he is not notified by the registrar when and where to report, and does not report, is he a deserter after that date? Will the registrar notify such men?

2. Are B men put in the same training as A men?

3. "I," his exemption reads "until June 1," he needs nothing but await notification from the registrar. If his exemption expires because of some other reason, such as a change in occupation or circumstances, he is bound to report to the registrar after that date. If he cannot be a deserter until he fails to report when ordered.

4. Does not every man who is called differently in various units, though some of their training is the same.

W. S. H. Q.—I am 25, and put in category E last fall. Am farming. Am I liable to be called for overseas service in Canada?

A.—Men in categories lower than A are liable to be called for re-examination at any time. If they are called in category A, they are liable to be called for overseas service. If they are called in category A, they are liable to be called for overseas service.

E. L. Dashwood. Q.—I am 19 years old and was examined last week for the R. F. C., and placed in category A. Will I still have to register before June 1?

A.—Unless you have been attested as a member of the Canadian Expeditionary Force, or of the R. F. C., you are still a civilian, and therefore must register. Once you are attested, you are a soldier, and are not bound to register.

ELMWOOD. Q.—Where should I write for a birth certificate and what will it cost?

A.—Write to the clerk of the municipality where your birth was registered, or to the registrar-general, Parliament Buildings, Toronto, Ont., if you were born in Ontario. The charge varies from 25 to 75 cents.

H. S. Hanover. Q.—I will be 19 next Monday. I was called in lower than A, could I be placed in some other category? I am a college graduate. Could I be placed where I could make use of it?

3. Are there any bugle bands here a fellow could join?

4. Can I still join up with the 6888 Battery? I am a piano player. Could I get into the battery orchestra?

5. Are there any forestry battalions open for recruits?

6. When would I go to join up, Toronto or London?

Can you not get a copy of the certificate from the clerk of the municipality in which you live. If not, get the sworn statements of reputable persons present at the time of your birth.

L. J. S. Q.—Could a 22 man, 21 years of age, whose exemption was cancelled, join the Northwest Mounted Police, if he went before notified to report? He is a volunteer.

2. When are the 22 men, 20 to 22, likely to be called?

3. If two brothers, 19 and 21, were drafted, and were the only sons of a man, would the one of them get leave of absence?

A.—1. Yes, if he had the other qualifications, he might be accepted.
