MR. BRYAN DIMS
HIS PARTY'S HOPE

By Stand for Government Control of Railroads.

SHOCK TO BEST FRIENDS

New York Speech Startles and Disheartens the "Peerless One's" Sanchest Followers.

New York, Sept. 2.—Even Mr. Bryan's closest friends and admirers admit that he distinctly has lost prestige by his appearance here in New York and by his speeches in Connecticut.

The more than five elements in the party was by no means prepared for the "peerless one's" radical adherence to the doctrine of government ownership of trunk lines, involving, as it does, the transfer of billions upon billions of actual property from private ownership to the control of the Government.

Old-time conservative Democrats, like Senator Daniel, of Virginia, had no hesitation in saying that they could not keep pace with the progressiveness of the Nebraska leader.

Even such a leader of the new thought as Governor Folk, of Missouri, did not hesitate to take issue with the government ownership ideas of the "peerless one." In the course of an interview during the afternoon, the Missouri governor said:

"The time has come when it may be feasible for the national government to own and operate the railroads of the country. I doubt much, however, if the people of Missouri would ever consent to bond their property for the sake of securing control of the railroads of the state."

"Forty years ago Missouri practically owned all the railroads within its boundaries. We issued bonds at that time to aid in the construction of the Wabash, Missouri Pacific, Iron Mountain, Burlington, Hannibal and St. Joseph, and other lines. All of the lines were foreclosed and the railroads were bought in by the state. The result was that the people of Missouri found themselves with millions upon millions of bonds which had to be paid, and in the long run the railroads were back in the hands of the people who built them."

When the smoke, and turmoil, and enthusiasm of the big meeting at Madison Square Garden had cleared away there was a distinct feeling of disappointment, and the rank and file of the Democrats, as well as the real leaders, were only too willing to express the feeling that Mr. Bryan's homecoming has been anything but a political gain for him.

People hereabouts, many of whom have investments in railroad securities, have by no means relished the declaration of Mr. Bryan that it favors the purchase by the Federal Government of all trunk line railroads in the United States.

Criticism which has been expressed regarding his platform has not been by any means confined to the Democratic Party. Bryan also advocates the ownership by states of local railroad lines.

The declaration of his original programme, as it was understood, was devised for the express purpose of satisfying the state sovereignty ideas of the southern party leaders. But everyone knows that nowadays practically all the railroads are parts of a trunk system, and it would be necessary for the national government to purchase control of what were practically the whole railroad system of the country, because the lines which are included within the boundaries of a single state are almost too unimportant to be mentioned.

Throughout the financial district in New York today the opinion generally was expressed that if the platform so glibly expressed by Mr. Bryan last night is to be adopted by the party at large, there will be a repetition two years from now of the memorable campaign of 1896. Mr. Bryan himself cleverly buried the silver issue in his speech last night, but by his adherence to the doctrine of government ownership of railroads he has aroused a feeling of the most intense opposition on the part of the great financial interests of the country.

It is declared his declaration for government ownership of railroads is quite as radical as the stand he took in 1896 for the payment of the debts of poor people through the medium of a depreciated dollar. Bankers, financial men and people who are accustomed to speak for the solid interests of New York are amazed that Mr. Bryan should assume to make such a declaration two years in advance of the next presidential election.

They say that because he modifies his platform there will be a repetition of the campaign of 1896, to the extent that a vast campaign will be conducted and the country will be aroused through the medium of campaign education practically identical with that by means of which Mark Hanna overwhelmed Bryan ten years ago.

Everybody who was present at the big meeting in Madison Square Garden last night recognized the fact that Mr. Bryan had made a mistake. There were dozens of party leaders there, like Bailey of Texas, Daniel of Virginia, McGraw of West Virginia, and others who did not hesitate to say that Mr. Bryan had struck a false note, and that he was endeavoring to commit the party to a platform which was dangerously near the rankest kind of socialism.

Long before the meeting was closed and long before Mr. Bryan had concluded his address, people began to leave the garden. The mood of Bryan's eloquence apparently had faded, and the same thing was noticeable today during his incursion into Connecticut. Mr. Bryan was warmly welcomed into New Haven, where a set speech had been arranged for, but at Stamford, South Norwalk and other towns along the line there were practically no crowds at the railroad stations, and there was apparently not the slightest interest manifested in the return to his native land of the distinguished traveler.

LOBO.

BIG ELEVATOR BLAZE.

Ottawa, Sept. 2.—Dowd's flour mill and elevator at Quyon, Que., were destroyed by fire early this morning. Defective electrical apparatus is held responsible. The loss will exceed \$5,000, and comes as exceptionally severe, as it is only a few weeks ago since the company's elevator at Pakenham, Ont., was destroyed from an alleged similar cause.

THE WIRETAPERS
TRAPPED AT LAST

Slick Gang Rounded Up by Windsor Detectives.

LOCATED ON COUNTRY ROAD

Surrender as Officers Draw Their Revolvers—News of Arrest Flashed to Track.

Detroit, Sept. 2.—"Well, Burley, old chap, they got you at last."

That was the message that flashed over the G. N. W. telegraph wire to the office at the Windsor race track yesterday afternoon. It was received by Charles Burlingame, representative of the Payne pool room service, and was sent by Frank Robinson, from a point five miles from the track, where the wires had been tapped.

"Throw up your hands!" cried four officers as they pounced down on the wire-tappers. Up they went, all but Robinson's, and he told the tale of their frustrated plans in this short message to Burlingame.

It was one of the biggest wire-tapping seizures made by the police in any section of the country in some time. For four days the wire has been tapped and this fact was known. Lined men had been dispatched as they suspected that it was not a great distance. Messages that went out in the regular course of the telegraphic service on either side of the river led to the conviction that a grand coup was to be pulled off yesterday.

When the wires were discovered, the straight tip was furnished to Provincial detectives Campeau and Mahoney.

The officers were at the Windsor track early in the afternoon and before the racing started they stepped into a carriage with two other officers and were driven hurriedly down the Tecumseh road. Their objective point was close to five miles from the race track. They drove toward the Pelette road in Sandwich East, and when a quarter of a mile east of this thoroughfare they told the driver to stop.

Pull Their Revolvers.

Revolvers slipped into the hand from the pocket and they made a hurried march through a cornfield which lies between the Pelette road and the Grand Trunk Railway. This brought them near the quarry, but the men they were looking for did not see them until the officers had sealed a fence and yelled the command—"throw up your hands."

The men were seated in the shade of a tree and the summons was promptly obeyed by all but Robinson, who sent first word of it to the track, then submitted to handcuffing with the rest. There was no show of resistance nor attempt to escape, the men showing up like clams and one of them observing that "another chance to get ever with d-d books has gone wrong."

The detectives made an examination of the surroundings and found a telephone cord, a single state wire, and a battery. One wire ran from the instrument to a nearby pole and connected with a wire which it sustained. The men and the implements were immediately taken to the Windsor police station. They registered as Frank Robinson, of St. Thomas, and A. S. Walsh, of Detroit. All of the men are young and they refused to talk.

It is expected that the officials of the Great Northwest Telephone Company will prosecute them as the wire is owned by them, and the pool room service went over it to the east.

Suspected of Former Work.

One of the quartet, Robinson, is an operator and worked at Ottawa, while Walsh is known as an operator in Detroit. The identity of the others is not known by the police, who have been endeavoring to get a line of their supposed confederates at the points where money would have been bet if the wire-tapping scheme had gone through.

The Windsor police and race track officials are of the belief that this is the same crowd that tapped the wire during the meeting held in June, when it is claimed that thousands of dollars was won in the New York and other pool rooms. Efforts to locate the men were fruitless at that time, and if the point where the tapping occurred was discovered it was kept quiet. Ten years ago a gang of wire-tappers were caught over there near the point where yesterday's arrests were made.

Detectives Campeau and Mahoney have no doubt of making a case out of this raid, as they say they caught the four red-handed. The men will probably have a hearing in Windsor on Tuesday.

MR. MCINTOSH HONORED

Elected 1st Vice-President of Division Court Clerks' Association.

The Division Court Clerks' Association of Ontario held their 21st annual meeting last week in the railway committee room at the Parliament buildings, Toronto. The old question of payment by fees for the various items in connection with a suit that does not exceed \$10, instead of the present system of a lump fee of \$15, was discussed. The proposed fee would amount to about \$15 in a suit of this size. The hope was expressed that the Legislature would deal with the matter at the next session.

The following officers were elected: Messrs. E. H. Duggan, Toronto, president; F. J. Bell, Peterboro, first vice-president; J. W. McIntosh, London, second vice-president; Peter McIntyre, Woodville, secretary-treasurer; executive committee, Messrs. Benjamin Allen, of Owen Sound, F. W. McQueen, of Woodstock, George F. Bruce, of Beaverton, C. E. Bourne, of Jarvis, E. J. Wilkins, of Galt.

The following were named as a legislative committee: Messrs. E. H. Duggan, Benjamin Allen, J. W. McIntosh, E. F. McMahon, of Richmond Hill, and J. Dougherty, of Mitchell.

Mr. Stewart Increases Wages of the Stage Crew—Attraction Today.

PHILADELPHIA'S CRASH

Trust Company's Affairs Found To Be in a Very Bad State.

Philadelphia, Pa., Sept. 2.—The creditors of the Real Estate Trust Company, which failed last Tuesday, are still without any definite knowledge of the true condition of the institution. Receiver Earle says he is very far from having reached the bottom of the affairs of the company.

"I do not believe," he said, "there is any collateral here that amounts to much except that furnished by Adolph Segal, who borrowed more than \$5,000,000 from the company."

Mr. Earle is giving considerable attention to the matter of responsibility for the condition of the trust company.

Public attention was called today to William F. North, the treasurer of the trust company, and Horace Hill, the auditor. Some of the directors feel these men should have discovered Mr. Hill's irregular transactions. Mr. North refuses to talk, and Mr. Hill says all the securities he examined were regular and he saw nothing wrong.

The Rev. Dr. William Henry Roberts, stated clerk of the Presbyterian General Assembly, has made formal application to the receiver to examine the securities of the trustees of the general assembly. These were in the custody of President Hipple and amount to nearly \$1,000,000.

"I feel sure that all the securities of the general assembly are safe," said Dr. Roberts.
