### A UNITED STATES OF EUROPE.

To the Editor of The Advertiser:

I don't believe that it is worth while for Lloyd George and Clemenceau and Wilson to spend months in deciding how much indemnity to ask from Germany because they won't get anything any way. The lot of the present German Government hangs on a thread, and it was to sign a treaty agreeing to pay a fraction of the allied demands, it could not survive another 24 hours. And then the deluge, i.e., Bolshevism and anarchy combined. Let's hope there will be a Noah and an Ark.

You might as well try to get blood out of a stone as to get enormous sums of money out of a Bolshevik regime, and the Russian debacle will be a picnic compared to the German show. The Germans are nothing if not thorough, and as the conservative element is stronger the explosion will be greater. Moreover, a league of nations as outlined by Wilson and company is a practical impossibility anyway. It contains no new principle; it is the old conception of the balance of power except that in this case the allies will have nearly all the weight in their scale. Huge armaments are to be maintained in America, England and France, for which the people will have to pay at a time when they will be least able to do so.

All the allies are living in the expectation of an indemnity from Germany, their whole fabric of credit is sustained by that expectation, when that hope does not materialize, let those who can "get out from under."

Some say "they won't pay, make them." "Occupy the country!"

Well, there are a few dozen Canadian, American, British and French soldiers in Siberia having compared with European conditions, a whole of a good time. The death rate from sickness and casualties combined is no higher there than in New York and yet the countries are raising hell. Colombia is getting the men back. If these countries were asked to send a few million men to fight the Bolsheviks of Germany, Austria and Central Europe there would be a danger of revolution at home.

True, they might make another attack on the European Bolsheviks and march on Berlin; if this armies were a colossal blunder and Wilson had better not have started his typewriter clicking a few months ago.

I believe that the prophecy of Count Tolstoy made—that after the conflict is over there will emerge out of chaos one United States of Europe—to be the only way out of the present dilemma. By this means the initial cause of all war will be eliminated. There is no danger of war between Ohio, Maine and Tennessee because they are all states of one country and owe allegiance and pay taxes to one government.

Tennesson's Parliament of man which is to end all war must include all nations, including the nation that gave the world Goethe, Beethoven, Mozart, Mendelssohn, Wagner, Schiller, Hegel, Kant and Martin Luther, which list includes the greatest composer, the greatest thinker and philosopher, the second greatest poet and the greatest religious reformer the world has known.

Even our Protestant religion, as Bishop Hallam declares, was made in Germany. Any parliament or league that presupposes the necessity of even more enormous armaments than we have maintained heretofore is doomed to failure as peace cannot be kept by force.

The world seems to forget that it is not Lloyd George, Wilson and Clemenceau that are shaking events, but the Infinite Intelligence that governs the Universe and compels the evil to serve its ends as much as the good. The allied premiers are only local statesmen with national aims. What is needed today is a world statesman; that is the need of the age. He that loves his own country better than another cannot possibly fill the bill.

We have not to evolve any man-made plan; it is for us to discover what plan lies already perfected on the knees of the gods. But before the inexorable trend of events, that will ultimately effect a union of all nations is accomplished, who can foresee to what extent mankind can escape the ravages of the transition period and a reign of terror? Thus much is certain, any stubborn refusal to the inevitable evolution of human institutions on the part of a person, class or church will only fan the flames of Bolshevism. No one can throw himself before the Cosmic Wheel of Progress without being destroyed. For the extent to which, in any one period, the world must progress is inevitable and predetermined.

Let us, saying aside all purely self-interest, all prejudice, try to discern in what direction the Guardian of Humanity is working. Let us seek to make his purpose our own, knowing that they who co-operate with the Infinite Design already share eternal life, and those who oppose are on the road to death.

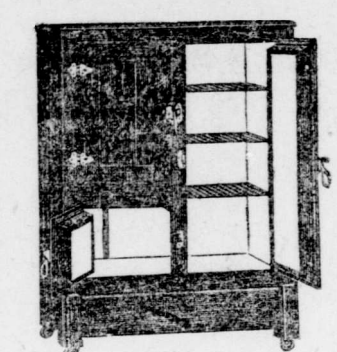

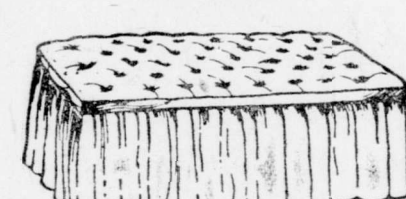

This Small Town Citizen as he depicts the calamity about to fall on the cities and towns if these farmers should get good money on the day of Commons. Just now, he says, they appear to have about three aims—the abolition of the fiscal system existing between Canada and the United States, the non-enactment of the daylight-saving bill, and the greatest possible representation of farmers in the Dominion House. This poor man has got the blues pretty bad, as he broods over the awful things that are going to happen to Canada if these farmers rule the country. Did any one ever hear such rot? Then he goes on to say that there is no doubt some change is necessary to uproot graft and party patronage. Quite likely it will introduce a new element, and elements savoring of the practical.

Now, sir, Small Town Citizen has written the last few lines a little more sanely than some of his former statements. He says, as to the abolition of party patronage—never. Small Town Citizen asks who will be the big man there? Undoubtedly, the farmer. He says if you want any proof of what the farmer will do for himself you have not to go far, with the insistent demands of this down-trodden class for free trade and the abolition of daylight-saving ringing in your ears. He takes a little more hopeful view when he says that long as the farmers hold no more than one-third of the seats in the House all may be well. But fear again takes hold of him when he says: Should the number be increased, especially in a peacetime time, when such a heavy national debt weighs down the country, all would be lost. He holds up his hands and looks piously up toward heaven when he exclaims: "God help the nation!"

Small Town Citizen says that in the town the farmers fill the House, for almost as sure as they are to ruin the country as they have ruined our small towns. Now, sir, why have not the farmers a good right to co-operate for their welfare in business, and even take their share in the legislation that bears most especially on their calling?

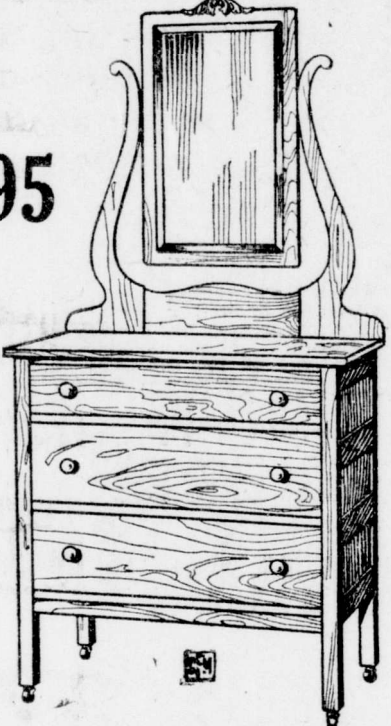

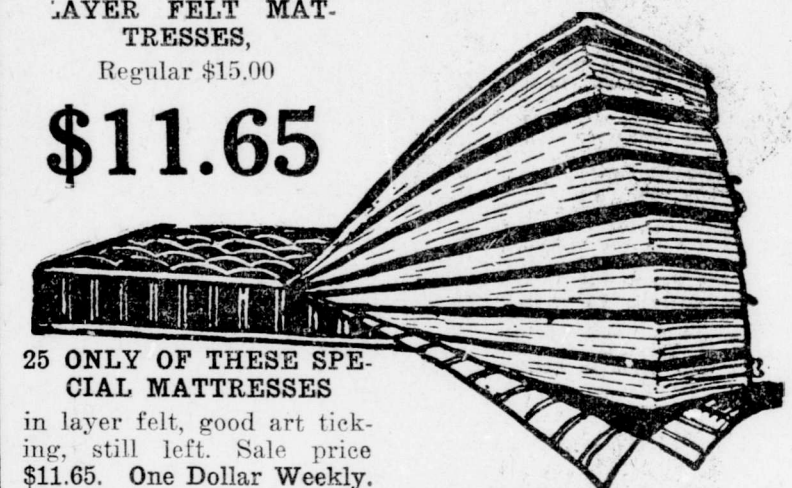
